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From the President's Desk



Dear Friends and Colleagues,

The year gone by has been a very fulfilling one for all of us at CASP as we were able to engage with newer programmes. We also aligned closely with the Swachh Bharat Abhiyan which we hope will make India a cleaner better place for the coming generations.

Our programmes in Mumbai for vocational training and health care continued even as we launched a School Improvement Programme in four schools (including one for special children) where we focussed on improving the school infrastructure and also provide the schools with materials.

In Pune the school WASH programmes continued to consolidate. We launched another school WASH programme which extended to improving the environment of the school. With both these programmes we have been able to extend our capacity to engage with communities and advocate for behavioural change.

Across Pune district our microfinance and livelihoods programme continued to grow till we had reached out to more than 4,000 women across more than 200 villages. In addition to assisting these marginalised women we also launched a reading and mathematical skills programme for young children. This has been implemented for 1000 children in 32 schools across the district and the metropolitan area of Pimpri Chinchwad and Pune.

In Delhi our work of providing support to first generation learners continues. As also our adult education programmes for women from underprivileged families who desire to continue their education. Here too we undertook programmes for improving the sanitation in schools as also improved the infrastructure. At the same time special programmes for special children and working children also continued.

In Gujarat we continued to support children from underprivileged families who live in small hamlets in remote areas of Kutch. We also continued our micro finance programme which provides women with the opportunity to establish or expand their businesses and pull their families out of poverty.

In the years ahead we will continue to develop and implement programmes that are relevant and address the changing needs of the country. We will continue to work towards a developed empowered society as we build a new India ...child by child.



CASP - At a Glance

Community Aid & Sponsorship Programme (CASP), a non Government, not-for-profit organization has been working across several states of India for almost four decades. The primary goal of the organisation is to provide underprivileged children with development opportunities.

CASP is governed by a group of eminent professionals from diverse fields, designated as the Governing Council. This body decides policies and guides the organization's workforce.

CASP is committed to engaging with the community in a participatory manner to assess development needs and implement programmes. Through the sponsorship programme the organisation has been successful in reaching out to underprivileged children, their families and the communities where live.

CASP facilitates, and in some cases actually provides, opportunities for children to access education, health, recreation, and later in life, livelihoods. But above all the organisation aims to prepare them to take on the challenges of life and participate in the development of India.

CASP collaborates with individuals and organisations that are willing to make a long term commitment and share our vision of developing self reliant communities where children are able to realise their rights. These include and state governments and several national and international organizations both Non Profits and commercial establishments. Some of these partnerships have been in place for years while others are more recent partnerships. Apart from these organisations CASP is also supported by individuals both in India and abroad who believe in the ability of CASP to change lives and thus provide assistance in their individual capacity. We are grateful for the support from all our individual and organisational partners.

CASP collaborates with Individuals and organisation that are the result of long term commitment and a joint vision of self reliant communities. Recently formed too are important as they have opened new avenues. CASP acknowledges the support it receives from individual and organizational sponsors in building relationships across the globe.

CASP implemented a variety of projects in the year 2014-2015 with a view to address locally relevant issues affecting children and their communities at multiple locations. A bouquet of programs for children were implemented including Early Childhood Care and Education, support for mainstream education, health initiatives particularly directed towards reproductive and child health (with a special focus on adolescent health) including HIV/AIDS awareness, increasing opportunities for livelihoods and community development. The programmes for community development focused on sanitation, habitat, access to services and care for the elderly. This year too we continued to focus on the participation of the common man in governance by engaging with the administration on the implementation of government programmes. Livelihood programmes were primarily directed towards women and youth, to ensure social justice and economic and social empowerment.

CASP has been focusing on the participation of children by empowering them and facilitating their inclusion in decision making and the monitoring of programmes. CASP believes that every child must be aware of her/his rights and the means to obtain and defend them. Bal Panchayats (Child councils) and Bal Sabhas (Children meetings) have been encouraged at every location where the organisation is working. Children are members of these bodies which diagnose community issues and participate in the resolution of the same. The children are personally instrumental in organizing workshops, meeting with decision makers and mobilizing resources. In a true sense this is a children's movement.

CASP has encouraged the participation of the communities not only as recipients of the services it offers, but as equal decision makers in planning, implementation and gradually increasing ownership of the projects. The thrust on encouraging the community, especially women, to form Community Based Organizations (CBOs) in all the locations where CASP works, is an ideal example of the focus on community involvement. Today the volunteer base from the community is the back bone of our programs. It is this partnership with the communities that has helped create a sustainable resource at all our program locations, both present and past.

CASP works through eight Units. Of these, four are in Maharashtra – Mumbai with a sub unit at Nagpur, Raigad District, Pune (Urban), and Pune (Rural). There are also two units in Delhi – CASP Delhi Unit (which also works in Western UP) and CASP Plan Unit and one each in Kerala (in collaboration with the Rajagiri College of Social Sciences), and in Gujarat at Kutch. Each unit has a set of activities which are based on the needs of the local community. Thus the organisation implements multidimensional programmes.

Each unit team is led by a Project manager and advised by a Chairperson. Efforts of all the team members at all locations deserve kudos for their dedication, perseverance and 'let's do it' attitude.

EARLY CHILDHOOD CARE AND DEVELOPMENT

Early Childhood

CASP implements programmes for early child development to provide children with a good start in life. The emphasis of this programme is to provide the mental and psychological stimulation necessary to infants for their brains to develop. Many children from underprivileged families, primarily those where both parents work are deprived of this. CASP therefore implements programmes to provide children and also parents with inputs.

In Delhi, the CASP-Plan project implements the ECCD programme in Badarpur and Madanpur Khadar since 2010. 25 community volunteers have provided parents inputs on the holistic development of the child. More than 670 families with children below the age of 3 years are beneficiaries of this intervention. ECCD communicators organised regular meetings to discuss various issues related to ECCD. Monthly home visits were also conducted to assess the home environment and offer advice to families. Parents were also encouraged to avail of the services of the ICDS.

Children of construction workers are especially at risk of poor development outcomes due to inadequate care while their parents work through the day. Due to limited resources parents allow children to move around unsupervised at the site and thus the children also run the risk of injuries. Keeping these children safe is the objective of the unit running 15 crèches in Delhi and NOIDA. These crèches which are located close to various construction sites cater to 498 children (272 girls and 226 boys). Further 105 children who were in the crèches last year and are now more than 6 years old have been enrolled in local schools in Class 1. In addition a health camp was organised for these children where 396 children were assessed for their growth parameters and any other medical issues.

CASP Delhi is running Balwadi for marginalised community children in Madanpur Khadar in South Delhi with support from AC International Development Fund. These children come from underprivileged backgrounds and are often first generation learners. The focus is on developing children's skills by enhancing their knowledge, and providing them with opportunities to engage in playing, sharing, learning and acting together. During the year 50 children attended Balwadi and 30 children of the appropriate age were admitted to Class I in formal school. These children are reported to be doing better in school. They are more confident and able to communicate better than other children.

CASP Raigad Unit runs balwadis at Shirki through Enfant du Monde, France and in Gorthan and Narangi through Child centered community development. These balwadis cater to a total of 80 children in the age group of 3 to 5 years. The new academic year of 3 DCC's started in the month of June 2016. It took nearly two weeks for the children to settle down and get acquainted with the DCC teachers. The educational aid was distributed in the month of July 2016, which consisted of school uniform, school bag, books, stationery, drawing book, crayons, slate with pencil box etc. This educational aid was distributed

in their respective areas at Shirki on 16th June 2016 & at Narangi & Vavoshi on 20th June 2016. All the children were very happy to receive the educational aid.

The unit provided biscuits to the children daily. The height and weight monitoring of the children is done after every three months.

Festivals like Dahi handi, Ganpati and Navratri were celebrated in the day care centers during the period August to October 2016. The children wore traditional dresses and were happy to celebrate the festivals.

Children's day in memory of our first Prime Minister Mr. Jawaharlal Nehru, who was very much fond of children, was celebrated in all the three day care centers in the months of November and December 2016.

CASP Raigad unit arranged medical checkup for 80 children in the month of December 2016, in the respective balwadis. All the children were given Deworming tablets.

An excursion for the children of Shirki, Narangi &

Gorthan Balwadi was arranged to Panoramic Garden Resort, Kalhe phata Taluka Panvel on 12th February 2017. They completed their desire of playing in water & various games & also enjoyed the round in a small train. They also tasted various kinds of eating items & they spent the whole day happily & their smiling faces gave lot of satisfaction to all of us.

CASP Mumbai Unit - 30 children of Marol area of Mumbai benefited from the Balwadi being run by CASP Mumbai Unit at Indira Gandhi Mahila Vikas Kendra, Marol, Andheri. The children are provided non formal education by the Balwadi teacher through various teaching aids and playschool methods. The parents of many of these children are not very highly educated and therefore ensuring they continue in education is a major focus of the Balwadi.



EDUCATION



Education

Education remains the primary focus of CASP's mission. We believe that it is today even more necessary than earlier that all children complete their basic education. A Class 10 certificate is today essential even to obtain a driving licence and many entry level jobs now demand a Class 12 education. Therefore one of the objectives of CASP in the years ahead will be to enable children to complete their Class 10.

Sponsorship continues to be the flagship programme of CASP. We define sponsorship as a process by which individuals who desire to provide support to underprivileged children, are put in contact with children, from underprivileged backgrounds who in the absence of such support would not be able to attain a basic essential education. Further child development as we see it goes beyond just education. Sponsored children participate in sports, drama, music, art and other creative endeavours so as to develop well rounded personalities. This programme is implemented by all units of CASP less the Pune rural unit.

Mumbai Unit

The Mumbai unit of CASP is the oldest and has

been implementing this programme since 1977. The details of sponsors supporting children in Mumbai can be seen on Page 22. The category wise Break-up of cases as on 31st March, 2017 under sponsorship programme was as follows:-

The activities implemented by CASP Mumbai under the sponsorship programme include: -

Disbursement of Aid is conducted each year after the needs of each child are assessed. Materials like school uniforms, school bags, umbrellas; stationary materials like compass box, colour box, pen, pencil etc were provided to 465 sponsored children. In addition support for college/school tuition fees and fees for remedial education classes were also provided to 660 children.

Family Assistance was provided to some families who are very poor and are need of support for



basic nutrition. Supplementary nutritious grain was provided to 91 children of CASP Mumbai Unit

Co-curricular activities

CASP Mumbai Unit organized annual get-together programme for sponsored children and their families on 18th January 2017 at 5.30 p.m. at Chhabildas High School, Mumbai. 198 children were felicitated at the hands of Chief Guest Marie Annick MASSE, Vice President, Enfant Du Monde, France and Guest of honour Elisabeth Menut, Enfant Du Monde, France.

The guests appreciated the scholastic performance of the sponsored children. Smt. Sudha Joshi, Vice President, CASP and Chairperson of Mumbai Unit presided over the function. The sponsored children also performed a programme of song and dance.

Achievements of Mumbai unit :-

- 1. 153 children appeared for Class X examination out of which 140 children passed.
- 2. 79 children appeared for the Class XII exams of which 69 children passed.

CASP Plan Delhi

CASP Plan Delhi which also implements a sponsorship programme which however does not envisage the disbursal of tangible benefits is working on improving the quality of education in government schools in Delhi. The focus of this project is to improve quality of education, children participation, and the formation and strengthening of School Management Committees.

The issues identified that required attention were that despite some very specific interventions, the education system was not able to reach all children and more especially girls. There was also a wide variation in the enrolment of girls between different slum communities in Delhi. Families who have migrated from Bangladesh are not interested /aware of the importance of education. Among the demand related constraints the most important was lack of awareness among parents about the need and importance of education. The supply-side constraints include the absence of an adequate number of functioning schools, lack of proper infrastructure in schools including toilets for girls, and poor quality of teaching. Some teachers are on a contract basis and thus have not received adequate teacher training and in some schools the teacher-student ratio is 1:70 children.

Education for Girls

To raise the enrolment and retention of girls in the schools, CASP-Plan created mass level awareness. The attitude of people towards girl's education is not encouraging. Various awareness generation events like Balika Diwas, community meetings, rallies and street plays were organised. IEC materials including posters, standees etc were designed to address the issue of education of girl children. As a result this year total 730 drop-out children were readmitted in the formal education system [387 girls and 343 boys.]

CASP-Plan is working with 12 Primary schools of Municipal Corporation of Delhi (MCD), in Madanpur Khadar and Badarpur area which have about 7700 children. An SMC has been formed in every school with 17 members in each SMC. SMC members have been trained on functioning of SMCs, and meaningful participation of all the members in the meetings (involvement in the decision making process). Regular meetings (at least once in two months) with SMC were conducted in the community as well as in schools. The purpose of the meetings was to make the SMC aware of provisions of the RTE act. Subsequently members motivated parents who were not sending their children to school. As a result 370 children were admitted to the schools. A school development plan has also been initiated by the SMCs in all the schools.

CASP-Plan has developed children's groups (Sadan) in all the 12 schools. Regular meetings with sadans were organized to develop their capacity, knowledge of child rights and child protection, and the importance of education. CASP-Plan has also formed peer to peer support groups in each of 12 schools. Two Manch (group of children studying in class 4th and 5th) ie Akash and Asha were formed. Students of the Akash Manch help the students of the Asha Manch with their Forming Manch has developed an atmosphere of friendliness among children and 720 children covered through the manch attend school regularly. Participation of sadan and Manch children in extracurricular activities was encouraged in various ways. Drawing competitions, quizzes and debates and education exposure visits to different places of Delhi were organised. Story telling sessions were also conducted.

Delhi Unit

Education is main instrument of empowerment; people of underprivileged society are deprived to access good and quality education facilities in the area. CASP is running various educational programmes with the intention to improve academic performance of the students also to aware and motivate the people about the importance of good education for their development.



Ensuring enrolment of non school going children is a major effort. However even after being enrolled these children do not perform well and require support classes and remedial education which is provide by CASP. A bridge school is run to assist women who have dropped out of education. These women are coached to appear for the Class 3, 5, 8, 10 and 12 exams administered by the National Institute of Open Schooling.

Under the sponsorship programme 523 children were provided educational materials including school uniforms, stationery, school bags, jacket etc. Funds to support tuition fees and charges for remedial / support classes were also provided to some children.

Road, Gurgaon, surrounded by the Aravali Hills, it is 50 KM from our programme area. A total 51 sponsored children participated in one day camp; 24 boys and 27 girls. They were accompanied by four staff members.

They start from home at 7.30 am, reached at camp site at 10.00 am. After breakfast they divided in small groups for different task.



Adventure Camps

The camp was a first of a kind for the children as they got to enjoy different activities like Army Obstacle Course (Burma Bridge, Beam Balancing), Artificial wall Climbing, Air Gun



Shooting, Pottery ,Rope Course, Team Building Games, Sports(Football, Volley Ball, Cricket). The students were excited during the camp. They completed the activities they were assigned. Many of them also managed to completed major activities like especially Wall climbing & Burma bridge, quite confidently. Throughout the day the students actively indulged in various activities and wished the activities didn't end.

They enjoyed good & delicious lunch and evening refreshment before leaving camp site. After three hours bus journey children reached their home by 9.00 pm.

Solar observation:

On the 21st of March, 2017, Space foundation associated with Community Aid and Sponsorship Programme (CASP) in Madanpur Khadar in Delhi. Total number of participant in this observation is 409 students from CASP's learning centres. The main objectives of this workshop were to:

- To teach them some facts about the universe.
- To make the students observe the sun and its features.
- To teach them about safe solar observation.
- To introduce them to equipments like safe filters and solar goggles for observing the sun.



Solar Observation

Programme was divided in two sessions first the students get an orientation through video presentation then with some basic introduction to the solar system. The session was interactive where the students participated actively by raising and answering questions. The students were very keen to learn something new and to gather more information. Basic facts about the sun, the planets and other physical phenomenon such as gravitation and the occurrence of day and night explained in the session.

Second session was set up in the open ground; it was designed to expose the students to the sun through telescopes and goggles. Each student was given an opportunity to look at the sun through the telescopes. This activity seemed to have grasped the students' attention and had them interested in the field of astronomy.

CASP Delhi had organized a picnic for children from centers. Children also visited the Doll Museum where they saw different type of dolls all over the world.

Around 2000 children enjoyed it. A 'Wish tree' was also made as a part of the activity on which children hung their wishes after writing them on a piece of paper in the hope that Santa would fulfill them. The children not only wished for toys, chocolate, doll house, racing car but also wished happiness for their family proper home to live,

Other children had also come with their parents to view the exhibition which in turn was also a learning experience for them.3

designed to encourage active participation and excel the imaginative and creative skills. Children were also performed play in small setup for better understanding and find connection with it.

400 children participated in a 10 day Creativity Workshop They learnt different type of painting techniques, Paper Craft, Clay Work and making many creative items from waste material.

Workshop on Financial Education

A workshop for the student of class XI, XII & college students was organized with the help of SEBI. A total 57 student participated in a one day workshop which happened on the 25th June 2016. The participants were told about the importance of financial planning in this workshop.







The workshop was appreciated by the students. They had always thought that financial planning was for the rich and people with plenty of money, but now realised that financial planning was for all.

Raigad Unit

CASP Raigad supported 475 sponsored children by providing them with tangible benefits like notebooks, textbooks, school uniform, school bag and stationery. The children were also supported through reimbursement of school/college fees and transportation expenses (from home to school and vice versa).



Educational Aid Distribution

Raigad unit supported 12 meritorious children through the Development fund received from Danish International Adoption, who are taking higher education in the field of Engineering and post graduate studies. The children were reimbursed college tuition fees, travelling & stationery expenses etc. Supervisory study classes are arranged through Raigad unit at Kandalepada for 13 children, Apta for 25 children.

Raigad unit had arranged a Diwali camp for 2 days on 7th November to 8th November 2016 at Bapdev Mandir, Savarsai (5 kms from Pen) for 100 children in the age group of 14 to 18 years.

The main objectives of this camp were:

- To develop their moral values during crisis situation.
- To create awareness regarding problems, precautions & solutions of adolescents.
- To give the platform to the children to show their capabilities and talents & boost up their confidence level.
- To provide new exposure to learn new things & increase their general knowledge.

Resource persons from Yusuf Meherally center Tara guided the children on the influence of Manav Suraksha Abhiyaan (Human Safety Movement) on all living organisms and on developing positive attitude. They also trained the children by giving different topics for street plays, group discussions etc. Yoga session was also held by them for the children. The children displayed their street plays in groups during the night.



Dr. Mrs. Sonali Vanage – Gynaecologist and Mrs. Arati Naik – teacher Raigad Zilla Parishad school Jambhivaliwadi Taluka Panvel held detailed interactive sessions with the girls on the scientific reason for menstrual cycle, reproduction and personal hygiene during menses. The girls were very much happy and reciprocated enthusiastically with questions to both the resource persons. Similar session was held with the boys by Mrs. Arati Naik on the change in the physical and mental condition of the boys during adolescent age.



Before the end of the camp on the second day, the prizes for the best group in street play, best camper (boy and girl) were given. Some children also expressed their views on CASP and their experiences during the two days of this Diwali camp. It was indeed remarkable to see their confidence boosting while standing in front of audience and speaking on the spot!

A one day seminar for 100 students of Xth Std was held at Pen on 14th November 2016 to guide the students on study and examination techniques. The children said these sessions helped them to improve their scholastic performance. Sessions on English, Science, and Maths were conducted by experienced teachers.



The seminar was held in three sessions. The first session was conducted by Mrs. Patwardhan on Alegbra and Geometry. The teacher made the session interactive by suggesting small tricks on solving the question paper and tried to minimize the fear of Maths in the minds of the children. The second session was conducted by Mrs. Patil on Science. She revised the experiments and figures along with numerical based on their textbook. After a short refreshment break. Mr. Pathak continued the seminar with the third session on He gave ideas to the students on formation of simple sentences, grammar, essay and paragraph writing. This is the third consecutive year that Raigad unit is holding guidance seminars for 10th standard students. Taking into the consideration the feedback received from the children for the third consecutive year, the seminar has helped the students to build up their confidence to face the state level board exam. They also learnt about time management techniques from the teachers which helped them to study consistently for the exams. Amisha Gawade – who attended the 10th std seminar last year secured 92.00% marks in



March 2016. According to her, "The overall support of CASP encouraged me to study hard and perform well in my exams. I attended the seminar held by CASP in the year 2015-16. The guidance provided by all the three teachers was very useful for me to prepare for my board exams. I followed the time management techniques suggested by the teachers which resulted in passing the exams with flying colours".

CASP Raigad unit celebrated the birth anniversary of Founder President Late Dr. Sharadchandra Gokhale on 21st September 2016. Total 200 sponsored children were present for the programme Drawing and essay competitions on current issues were held in five villages i.e. Kandale, Kandalepada, Irwadi, Shirki and Pen, during 14th to 20th September 2016. 70 children participated in these competitions. Mr. Uday Thakar – Treasurer Shantivan Nere, Panvel a friend of Late. Dr. Gokhale was the Chief Guest for the programme. He introduced the life of Dr. Gokhale and the great social work done by him especially in the field of leprosy eradication and rehabilitation.



He also interacted with the children and spoke on the development of mental capacity, so that when these children grow up they will be able to face any difficulty which they will come across in their life.

Ms. Bhagyashree 20721/SH-CASP Raigad unit alumni expressed her thoughts about the role of

CASP from her childhood till she completed her education as a Diploma Engineer. According to her, "CASP was always there with me as a helping hand whenever I faced any problem. development promoters always encouraged me and motivated me to complete my education in spite of my poor financial condition. I also thank my sponsor Children above all, Sweden who supported me from 4th std till I completed my diploma engineering". Ms. Vasanti Mhatre and Mr. Gajanan Takale-parents of sponsored children Neelam Mhatre-20709/SH and Gauri Takale-52141/SH respectively, thanked CASP and their sponsors who are supporting their children to continue their education smoothly. They also mentioned that the children get good exposure and encouragement by attending the personality development camps arranged by CASP.

Three children each for drawing and essay competitions were given prizes through the hands of the Chief Guests.

Ms. Nivedita Thakor-Co-ordinator CASP Raigad unit congratulated the participants as well as the winners of the essay and drawing competition. She appealed to the children to make the utmost use of this sponsorship support and become self reliant in the future which will be a tribute to Dr. Sharadchandra Gokhale in the real sense!

The drawings of the participants of the competitions were displayed in the hall. The children were very happy and motivated to know the inspiring life of Late Dr. Sharadchandra Gokhale.

A workshop on self defence was conducted on 14th May 2016 for 100 girls of Pen, Kandale, Kandalepada, Irwadi, Apta, Amtem, Vavoshi, Gorthan, Narangi, Tondali and Swali in the age group of 14-20 years at Rameshwar Hall, Pen. Practical self defense techniques and power point presentations through projector and lecture session were conducted by Ms. Madhurshree Varunjkar, Mahesh Ghase and group.



A workshop on Eradication of Superstitions and beliefs for 230 parents of sponsored children of Amtem, Kandale, Kandalepada, Shirki, Irwadi, Pen and tribal villages Chawane, Khutalwadi, Peruchiwadi, Gaicharanwadi and Sawanewadi was conducted on 18th November 2016 at Rameshwar hall, Pen.



The objectives of this workshop were:

- > To educate people on anti superstition law and its clauses.
- To associate common people to identify and track such acts if performed at rural level.
- ➤ To involve parents of school going children because children are more prone to absorb such beliefs from the society.

The programme started with a street play on the practices prevailing in the villages especially the tribal areas where the patient is taken to a baba instead of a doctor during emergency medical situations.



Mr. P B Hande- Vice President Anddha Shraddha Nirmulan Samiti, Panvel and his group addressed the participants regarding the ill effects of Superstitions and beliefs through demonstrations, songs, magic tricks etc. This appealed the participants very much.



Mr. Nitin Raut Secretary of Anddha Shraddha Nirmulan Samiti, Maharashtra state was the Chief Guest of the programme. He interacted with the participants citing his experiences while visiting the rural Maharashtra for creating awareness among the people who fall prey to the sadhus and mouni babas and become their victims. He observed that most of the couple's visit babas for a baby boy. He appealed the participants to approach a doctor in case of a medical emergency and not to visit any baba or tantric, which might be life threatening in some cases. In addition to this Mr. Devidas Patil – member of Anddha Shraddha



Nirmulan Samiti spoke on gender discrimination issues, wrong beliefs on menstrual period of women which generally results in low attendance of women and girls in schools, during a religious ceremony etc. He highlighted the importance of hygiene to be maintained during the menses.



- Poster exhibition on superstitions and beliefs was arranged in the hall.
- > The programme ended with a vote of thanks by development promoter of CASP. development promoters of CASP will keep a regular follow up with the parents during their home visits in the villages.

A creativity workshop was held in the third week of May 2016 for 12 girls from balpanchayat groups of Kandale, Kandalepada & Irwadi at Pen. The workshop was conducted by Ms. Madhavi Dev. She taught decorative ornaments, clips, necklace to the girls.



CASP Raigad unit had arranged an Annual Get together and felicitation programme for their sponsored children and their families on 5th January 2017 at Rameshwar Mandir Hall in the presence of dignitaries of CASP i.e Ms. Parinita Pal Chairperson Raigad Unit and Ms. Mohini Mittal Manager Programmes CASP HO. The Hon'ble Chief Guests for the function was Ms. Prajakta Rangnekar Retd Lecturer.



Ms. Parinita Pal presided over the function. Over 450 sponsored children and their families, who had come from the remote areas of Raigad district, attended the function.

The programme started with the felicitation of 86 sponsored children for their outstanding performance in studies. The Chief Guest and other dignitaries of CASP felicitated the children. It has been observed that this felicitation sets an example to other children to secure good marks in their exams.



Ms. Mohini Mittal congratulated all the children who received prizes and appealed to all the other children to follow their steps. On January 2nd Christmas/New Year was celebrated at both the centres.

RAJAGIRI outREACH conducted a residential Career Guidance Camp for SSLC students from all the centers at Rajagiri campus from 27th and 28th December 2016. Among the participants 2 of them were sponsored by CASP. Sessions on Motivation, Adolescent Education, Career Guidance, Effective Study Tips, Time Management

etc. were delivered. Students got opportunity to share their fears/anxiety regarding examinations and received counselling through face to face sessions.

TDH Team visit

A 10 member team led by Ms.Dorthe Kristensen had visited Arattupuzha and Edavanakkad from January 16th to 19. The team visited Rajagiri outREACH office, houses of sponsored students and Women Entrepreneurship projects. They also interacted with the Development committee members and LSG representatives.

In order to maintain a good relationship with the children and families, house visits were conducted regularly. Special efforts were taken to visit all SSLC and Plus Two students appearing for the examination. Through these visits, the family environment, could be assessed and supportive services arranged if a need was perceived. School visits were undertaken to assess the performance of the children at school level and also to obtain the participation of the schools and teachers in the programme. Through these visits the performance of each student was assessed and the teachers perception of areas where the child required support was ascertained. Information about sponsored children who had some issues at home was also shared with teachers in confidence to obtain the support and special attention of the teachers. The Social Workers conducted at least two house and school visits for each child in the year.

Souhrudam (friendship) camp is conducted every year to improve the social and personal development of the students between the ages of 6-16 years. It is conducted not only for the sponsored students but also for others in the area. In 2016, the camp theme was "Immini Ballya Njan" which was focused on the rights and responsibilities of the children. Children were grouped according to their age and class. Songs, action songs, skits, mimes, project works, and lecture on the topic etc were the major tools used to inculcate the theme. At Edavanakkad and Arattupuzha the camp was held from April 20th to 22nd and May 2nd to 4th respectively.



Souhrudam (Friendship) Camp

CASP Pune 506 children (202 boys and 334 girls) are supported under the general sponsorship programme in Pune. Aid is disbursed to all the children under the programme by the following means: -

- 1. Distribution of need based educational material - 300 children till 10th std were provided with note books, school bag, drawing material and school stationery.
- 2. 44 children from 10th std students were provided with a set of Most Likely Question set.
- 3. The unit partially paid the college fees of 180 children.
- 4. Partial school tuition fees and fees for coaching class and school fees were reimbursed to 450 children.

CASP Pune Rural implemented the Shikshan Project, a feather in the cap of our organisation. This educational project for the children of women who are marginalised and without support is being implemented in 10 talukas of Pune district. This project focuses on the enrolment of those children who have "never been to school" category, and re-enrolment of those children who have "dropped out of education". The aim being to reintegrate these children into mainstream society through formal school education and thus creating opportunity for higher studies.

In the first year 35 remedial education centres have been established and are providing remedial education to needy children. A total of 1030 children (588 boys and 442 girls) are enrolled in the remedial classes. The centres are all located within the schools.

The project focusses on reading skills and basic mathematical concepts. The educators use various teaching learning materials which are child friendly. Apart from teaching, Shikshan educators counsel and sensitize parents of these children on Right to Education Act, food security and nutrition, health, psychosocial support and child protection. Educators have also faclitated





these single mothers in applying for government schemes, by helping them prepare applications and submit them.

GUJARAT

EDUCATION:- Education Material Distribution to Sponsored Children: There were 317 sponsored children provided with education material in both terms during the year. School Uniforms, School bag, School Books, Notebooks, School stationary and all the other requirement items given to child as per requirement. There are 12 sponsored children were provided with school transportation support while 21 children were provided with school/college fees.



CASP Gujarat has been running 8 Remedial education classes in 6 villages of project area. There are 182 sponsored and 124 Non sponsored children are taking benefit of CASP centers. These centers have been providing academic support which children lack in school and provide extra coaching with the aim of education without burden. Children library, Sports corner are the part of these centers. Children enjoys to participate in various days celebration here. Kite Festival, Gandhi Jayanti, Ambedkar Jayanti, Rakshabandhan, Christmas, sparrow day, World Environment day, Women day, New Year were celebrated with children at these centers.



Due to conservative mind set people not allow for education even for primary education in some places so higher education is challenge for these girls. From last two years CASP Gujarat with support of Mr Ivan Dalsgaard encourage for higher education. There were 10 Girls from Badaragadh and 5 girls from Lakhamsari hamlet enrolled in standard 9th from CASP and provided with all support of education material and also for school transportation at initial stage. Due to this intervention of CASP for higher education, people aware about this and now from two years girls enrolment from these both villages increases.

Praveshotsav:-

CASP Gujarat supports state Government's initiative of enrolling each and every child in school age of 5 to 14. This year CASP Gujarat has supported in three primary school of Kaththaddhar, Dudhdairy and Khirai and provided with required educational items to 37 children to motivate for education.





BICYCLE DISTRIBUTION:-

Distance is a big hurdle in achieving one's dreams but it is a serious issue in remote areas of Kutch District, Gujarat where children has to travel 15-20Kms daily to attain their higher education. In action to resolve this problem to some extent





Tipsmidler (TdH Denmark) supported for 17 Bicycle to Sponsored adolescent boy & girl of CASP Gujarat Unit. There were 12 girls and 5 boys handed over with new Bicycles by Mr. Ivan Dalsgaard (Leader, TdH Denmark).

SCHOOL SUPPORT PROJECT:-

From Mr Ivan Dalsgaard and Tipsmidler Funds of TdH Denmark, CASP Gujarat has been supporting



24 schools of Project area. Daily newspaper and magazine has been providing in these schools. CASP Gujarat Supported two Government schools- Khirai and Momaivandh with LED television with BISAG dish thus children can get benefit of Educational programmes which is broadcast from Educational Dept. CASP Gujarat has been working closely with these 24 schools and during the year arranged various programmes





for education, health and awareness on various issues along with sports and other recreational activities. 5 Govt schools of Khadir area and two in Lakadia village provided with sports equipments.

With the aim of enhance interest of children towards Astronomy, CASP Gujarat Unit has arranged Sky Observation Program at Vinay Vidhyamandir at Nilpar , Rapar with Kutch Astronomy Club. Under school Support project of Tipsmidler – TdH Denmark this telescope was provided to the school and this event of Night sky observation was arranged. Celebrating global astronomy Month 2017 under direction of Mr Narendra Gor – President of Kutch Astronomy Club and Mr Dayaram Jansari and Dr Dinesh Panchal there were more than 150 students of Vinay vidhyamandir - Gram Swaraj Sangh got opportunity of observing sky.





165 children participated in summer camps in 5 villages and learnt new things from the resource persons for 5 days in each center. Later in winter 5 children along with 3 volunteers from Lokmitra Dhedhuki village conducted training sessions on Color work, printing on cloth, spray printing, preparing items from papers, paper bag etc for 241 children of Project area.

Mr Ivan Dalsgaard of TdH Denmark, CASP had earlier supported the music training for Jamana of





Lakhamsari and then provided harmonium to her. Today she performs at various events and earns a good living.

46 children from Kaththaddhar and Momaivandh



area of Rapar enjoyed picnic at Amrutbag resort and Ekal While Desert. They spent wonderful one day with lots of activities and games and enjoyed lot.



72 sponsored children and 30 children of Lakhamsari Primary school enjoyed a one day educational tour of Bhuj. They visited Kutch Museum, Aina Mahal, Parle G factory, Lok Vigyan Kendra run by Indian Planetary society, Hill Garden etc.



Mr Ivan Dalsgaard – TdH Denmark supported an educational visit for 86 Sponsored children and with some of the alumni, visited Ahmedabad and Gandhinagar and spent two days there and visited





Kankariya lake, Gujarat State Assembly (Vidhansabha) and Akshardham temple. The children also met State Home and Law minister Mr Pradipsinh Jadeja.

CASP Gujarat Unit organized the Under 14 Cricket Tournament for boys and girls of 8 schools of Lakadiya Village for the fifth time this year. The event in the month of February was inaugurated by Mr. Ivan Dalsgaard, TdH, who is a sponsor of this grand event. During the event all participants of winner and runner ups team have been felicitated

by medals and certificates. And at the closing ceremony trophies were awarded to the champions, runners ups as well as to the best player of the tournament.



CASP Gujarat arranged two Career Guidance Seminar with support from the Government Arts and Commerce College of Rapar. Author of 150 Books, prominent motivational speaker and educationalist Mr Haresh Dholakiya invited for key speech. More than 400 students of standard 10th and 12th participated in this lecture of Mr Dholakia.



A Cultural Programme – 'Saptrang" was organised at Rapar Town hall in the presence of Chief Guest Mr Ivan Dalsgaard (TdH Denmark) with more than 350 sponsored children, alumni, siblings of children and members of Village Development Committee.

Children from 11 villages presented various songs and dances including the Garba during the programme. Alumni and sponsored children offered their thanks to CASP and Mr Ivan Dalsgaard for the support offered. Shantiben Solanki a beneficiary of the VAMASVA project explained how the revolving fund had changed her life. Mr Ivan Dalsgaard felicitated sponsored children who achieved first rank in their class in the last annual examination. Mr Ivan Dalsgaard also thanked all the children and the CASP family for their love for him.



SPONSORSHIP Related PROJECTS

CASP implements numerous projects that are based on the sponsorship model but differ in the fact that the objectives or the funding patterns are tailored to the requirements of the beneficiaries or the donor. These projects are described in this section.

Foster Care Project (Bal Sangopan Yojana)

CASP is associated with the Women and Child Development Department of Government of Maharashtra and is implementing the foster care scheme since 2007. The objective of the scheme is to support children from underprivileged families to complete their education. The children are orphans, have a single parent or the parents are undergoing life imprisonment; parents have serious illnesses or are otherwise not able to support the child adequately. As per government norms families of these children receive Rs.5100/annually via cheque in 2 installments. CASP is accountable to the government to ensure that the money is utilized by the family for the child's education. CASP provides the children with additional inputs (including education, health, nutrition etc) to achieve the overall development of children. 500 children (248 boys and 252 girls) in Mumbai and 500 children (224 boys and 226 girls) in Pune are supported under this programme.

Integrated Child Development Through Sponsorship Programme - Supported by Whirlpool India Pvt Ltd, Pune

This project is implemented in the villages of Ranjangaon, Dhoksangvi and Karegaon in Shirur Taluka located near the Ranjangaon Industrial Area. 300 children (135 males and 165 females) from underprivileged families are supported under this programme. The objective is to ensure at least 90% children under the program complete their basic education.

The project was launched in Oct 2014 and eligible children were identified. The children are given educational support and co curricular activities are organized for their all round development. Importance is given to encourage children to attend school regularly and participate in extracurricular activities.

Sponsorship of 250 Children Pune City supported by Yardi Software

Educational Sponsorship Assistance is provided to children from urban slums - Janta Vasahat and Gosavi Vasti are selected under this project. The objective is to provide opportunities for underprivileged children from slums to complete their basic education and their all round development. The children have been provided with need based educational material. Activities



like craft. Creative writing, drawing, storytelling etc are organized for the children.















SPECIAL PROJECT



Special Projects

Special Children

CASP continued to implement projects for differently abled children. These were planned to aim to assist these special children be as self reliant and independent as possible.

The Muskan project, being implemented by CASP Plan Delhi aims to assist children from underprivileged families who are mentally or physically challenged. CASP-Plan is implementing this project in Sangam Vihar with "inclusion" as its primary focus. CASP works to prepare the children for admission to mainstream schools (as guaranteed by the Right to Education). During the year a total of 207 children (124 boys and 83 girls) were mainstreamed. Of these 26 children were admitted to Govt. schools

- 49 children received the disability certificates from Govt. authorities
- 5 children obtained Rail Concessional certificates.
- IEPs of 207 children were developed as per their IQ level and same IEPs have been executed in The CRRCs.
- 18 children have received disability pension from Govt.

- 22 children were provided Mobility Aids from various NGOs through networking
- 48 Children now have health insurance under Niramaya schemes

Various hospitals in Delhi (including Pandit Madan Mohan Malviya Hospital, National Institute for Mentally Handicapped, R.M.L Hospital and G.B.Pant Hospital, provide assistance in assessment of special children and issuing disability certificates and Rail concession certificate. These provide children with access to disability pension under the Disability Act and the facility of free travelling in Indian Railway with escort. The project has intensively networked with agencies such as NIMH, NIHH, Amar Jyoti Charitable Trust, National Association for Blind, Blind Relief Association, Govt. schools and various other organizations.

CASP Mumbai Unit runs a special sponsorship programme for physically and mentally challenged children of employees of the Mumbai Port Trust. Seven children are supported under this programme where the children are provided with additional assistance for continuing their children's education as well as medical treatment. The staff of CASP provided motivation, counseling and guidance to the parents as well as sponsored



children. These were provided by means of both home visits and school engagements. During the period under report, educational and medical assistance has been provided to the 7 sponsored children and they have been facilitated to apply for various entitlements from the govt and from other NGOs.

Sumeet Foundation which is managed by a former Trustee and Hon. Treasurer of CASP Shri SR Mehta continued to work with CASP for special children. In the year the foundation provided assistance to children who were challenged and marginalized by providing them with hearing aid cells, scholarships.

1. School Improvement Program

CASP PLAN Project-School Improvement Program, supported by Samsung C&T, was implemented in three schools in Bhandup, Mulund and one Special School in Dadar from January 2016 to June 2017 for 2837 children (Boys 1394 and Girls 1443). The project worked on





WASH for Hardware and Software activities, in which it supported for improving the School Infrastructure along with toilets, classrooms, drinking water facilities, library. Along with this, various awareness programs on Hygiene & Sanitation, like Workshops for Children's Clubs, Adolescent Girls, SMCs and Teachers and Principle were conducted. For awareness on Right to Education, Awareness Rallies and Street Plays were organized in community and Workshops for Parents were organized in the schools. Some other awareness activities have been also conducted in the School campuses and Samsung Volunteer Activities were also organized.

The project helped the schools by providing various materials like Sports Material, Teaching and Learning Material, furniture for Classrooms and Library. It also helped for the Repair as well as construction of Disable Friendly Toilets and construction of Changing Room with establishing Incinerator Machines (for hygienic disposal of used sanitary napkins) for Girls.







Children of Jail Inmates



CASP Delhi continued its support for children of inmates of Tihar Jail. 118 children (54 boys and 82 girls) continue to be supported with funds provided by TdH Denmark (67 children) and KC Mahindra Education Trust (51 children). The children range from Class I to class 12 and are provided with support till they complete school or

their parents were released from jail.

All children are provided school uniform, shoes & socks, books, note-books, pencil box & other stationary items required for proper schooling. In case they face financial constraints school fees are also reimbursed. Families who require it are also provided legal assistance and nutritional support.

The children are also provided with opportunities for entertainment and learning. They participated in a creativity workshop last summer where they learned how to make paper flowers, design jewellery and work with clay. The children and their families were also taken for a picnic to the Delhi zoo where they were able to see animals they only hear and read about.

CASP Pune Unit supported by Yardi Software implemented the Ensuring Education Continues project. 50 children from underprivileged families of Janata Vasahat who were identified as weak in studies and unlikely to pass their Class X exams by the school teachers are the beneficiaries. CASP took this up as a challenge and has commenced an



intervention with them since Dec 2014. Special tuition classes are arranged for these children to help them with their weak subjects. Home visits are conducted to understand the issues within the family and help them to resolve them. Parents and children's meetings are arranged to motivate the children and parents to help the child to complete his/her basic education. Quarterly parents meetings are arranged for the parents of children under Ensuring Education continues project in Janata Vasahat.

Seven children were identified as having major problems in reading and writing. They underwent learning disability and IQ assessment in Morris Trust and later also at Sasoon hospital for Government Board certification. This certificate ensures that children are provided with concessions while appearing for the board exams. Three girls were certified to have learning disability and have got a certificate. Next year they will appear for the board exams where they will be provided facilities like - Reader, Writer, and Extra time and allowed to use a calculator.

OTHER RECREATIONAL ACTIVITIES /PROGRAMMES:-

CASP-Plan Delhi Unit

CASP projects for differently abled children aim to assist these special children to attain the fullest extent of their genetic potential. This is despite the restrictions placed by their being physically, or mentally challenged.

The Muskan project, being implemented by CASP Plan Delhi aims to enable children who are mentally or physically challenged and also socially deprived CASP-Plan is implementing this project in Sangam Vihar, with the key goal of "inclusion." CASP aims to ensure that special children are able to join mainstream schools (as guaranteed by the Right to Education). Total 207 children (124 boys and 83 girls) benefited Mainstreamed 26children in Govt. schools

- Child Labour Project
- Children involved in labor activities are a big question mark on the policies and future of the growing India. Children involved in workforce, not only remain devoid of their childhood but also, live and work in very harmful conditions at the stake of their lives. To address the issue of child labor with focus on the rag picking activities, the consultation on 'Legal Provisions and Interventions for Protection of Child Rights: Challenges and Next Steps' was organized by CAS-Plan.

Key Outcomes of the consultation:

The consultation brought into discussion:

- Issue of child labor with emphasis on children involved in rag picking.
- Role of institutions in addressing the issue.
- Effectiveness of law on life of children involved in labor activities.
- Budget for children holistic development.

Conclusion:

The consultation provided a platform to discuss the child labor issues with focus on children involved in rag picking. It provided an opportunity to hear the views of participants who are directly or indirectly working on child labor issues. The consultation became the meeting point for views from following department:



HEALTH

Health

CASP views health as an important factor in the development of children. Their health determines their ability to grow, learn and thus contribute to society and the economy in the future. Therefore CASP continued its interventions by instituting health programmes.

CASP Mumbai continued its interventions in Filterpada, Madh and JVLR areas of Mumbai. 17 Community Health Workers continued to provide information to the residents and to encourage them to avail of the services provided by the government.

CASP-Plan Delhi implemented the "Optimal Health" project in Madanpur Khadar and Badarpur focusing on maternal and child health. 25 community health workers identify pregnant women and encourage them to deliver their babies in institutions. During the reporting period 780 deliveries were reported by the CHWs out of which 520 was institutional deliveries. As compared to last year institutional deliveries have increased by 10%.

Awareness sessions on immunization, nutrition, birth preparedness, antenatal check-ups and high risk pregnancies are also regularly conducted.1260 mothers have attended the sessions. 40 women having high risk symptoms were referred to Primary Health Centre. Linkages have been established with ICDS Anganwadi workers and Primary Health Centre to increase uptake of child and mother's health services. Total 1113 children were immunized through the support of 25 Community Health Workers.

A TB clinic is run in collaboration with Dr. Lala Ram Saroop hospital where 52 patients were registered and 14 patients completed their treatment.

Mobile health camp(Swasthya Mela) was organized in collaboration with AWC & PHC. The camp was focus on child health issues like diarrhoea, malnutrition, ARI, immunization etc. Total 2000 mothers have participated in the camp.

6 mother support groups having 60 members have been established in the community who are disseminating the information on immunization and nutrition in the ICDS Centres.

CASP Delhi has been providing preventive and curative services to the residents of Madanpur Khadar. Towards prevention the unit organised six health camps to create awareness about diseases that are prevalent in the area. More than 1,500 people attended these camps and received information about Tuberculosis, Water-borne diseases (like Typhoid fever, Cholera and Hepatitis A), Vector-borne diseases (malaria and dengue), Diabetes, Malnutrition and Family Planning. A dental care check up and treatment camp was also organised.

Myopia is a common cause of poor scholastic performance and cataract remains the most common cause of preventable blindness in India. Camps were conducted with assistance from the RP Centre for Ophthalmic Sciences the apex eye care institution in the country. Almost 3,000 individuals attended these camps were 86 people received cataract care. 57 children of school going age and another 745 people who were older were prescribed spectacles at these camps which were free of cost.

CASP PUNE UNIT - SWACHH BHARAT SWACHH VIDYALAYA PROJECT

The 'Urban WASH - Swachh Bharat Swachh Vidyalaya' project is funded by USAID, COCA COLA India Pvt,Ltd and Plan India.The project aims to promote sanitation, effective use and ownership of school Water, Sanitation and Hygiene infrastructure. Girls and boys will have access to

potable water, safe sanitation. It also focuses on gender sensitive, child friendly environment, and gives special attention on menstrual hygiene. Thereby, enabling duty bearers and children to realize their right to equitable and sustainable access to improved sanitation facilities, girls changing rooms and safe drinking water supplies, and to practice good hygiene behaviors.

The project was officially launched on 22nd Dec 2016 in Pune The project inaugurations were marked by powerful WASH messaging through street plays and the Swachh Bharat pledge led by children.

Community Aid and Sponsorship Program (CASP) is the city partner of Pune with PLAN India for overall implementation of the program.

As a first step a baseline study was conducted at PMC schools in Pune to understand the water sanitation hygiene facilities infrastructure scenario in these 20 Schools. The BOQ was prepared for 20 schools by technical consultant.

On 22nd March 2017 "World Water Day" Programme arranged in PMC school 160 B Telco Colony Datta nagar, Pandit Dindayal Primary School. Displayed animated short film to students on water conservation and took feedback. The children were also informed about hand wash practice and maintaining menstrual hygiene. A street play was conducted at Kelewadi community by school students on "Water Conservation and Water Pollution for Awareness of water conservation.





ADOLESCENTS



Adolescents

Adolescents continue to remain an important group for CASP. CASP has been working with adolescents for many years now. This age group is particularly vulnerable and requires programmes specially designed to address their concerns.



CASP Plan Delhi continued to implement the "Safer Cities for Girls" project. Under this project the communities are involved in identifying areas where girls and even young boys feel unsafe and help them identify safe spaces. The project also aims to bring these issues to the notice of the duty bearers. This advocacy has resulted in increased awareness and greater initiative on the part of all sections of society.

50 adolescent girls have attended 10 days training on "Self Defence" given by Delhi Police. These girls were also awarded a certificate of completion of training.

CASP Gujarat organises a "Under 14 years cricket tournament" for students of the seven schools in and around Lakadia. The tournament is organised for both boys and also for girls. This is a unique initiative that initially faced a lot of doubts from the community. But today this has become a regular feature for CASP. 135 players of 9 teams participated in this event which received tremendous support from community leaders, Gram Panchayat and officers from the education dept. Lakhamsari Primary School won the trophy of the girls tournament while Government Boys Primary School won the boys under 14 cricket

tournament winning trophy.

CASP Gujarat has also been promoting three Kishori Groups in Lakadia, Khirai and Badargadh village. Health awareness and personal hygiene care sessions were arranged by CASP for these adolescents group.

CASP Mumbai worked for Adolescent groups in different projects focusing on their awareness and counselling. In the CASP PLAN School Improvement Program, the awareness sessions for total 241 Adolescent girls, were organized in three schools in July 2016, on Menstrual Hygiene and other Daily Hygiene practices with guidance of Medical professional.









In the L&T project, Training on Health education for Adolescent Boys and Girls were organized, where they have been given the training on the topic like Physical development, emotional changes and interpersonal relationship etc. Total 50 boys and 50 girls participated in the training programme.



In the JVLR Project training for Adolescent, conducted for 50 boys and 50 girls on 19th February 2017 on the topics like Physical development, emotional changes and Interpersonal relationship and Health education.





SENIOR CITIZENS

Senior Citizens

CASP recognizes seniors as a valuable asset within communities and families as they provide children with a sense of belonging and stability. This is particularly s where mothers are working and it is the grandparents who primarily care for the children. CASP also recognises seniors as change agents who can bring about major changes especially in a society like ours where seniors are treated with due respect.

Seniors particularly those in poor communities tend to suffer from poor self esteem and see themselves as a hindrance. They do not find place for themselves in their homes and tend to be in poor physical and mental health. In order to mitigate their situation CASP runs Senior Citizens Centres with the following objectives: -

- 1) To maintain health of elderly people
- 2) To provide psychological support to elderly people
- 3) To engage the elderly with current developments.

SENIOR CITIZEN CENTRES FOR ELDERLY PEOPLE

CASP Mumbai Unit runs three senior citizen centre for elderly people with support from Bombay Community Public Trust. These are located at:

- Ram Mandir Hall, Fishermen colony, Mahim, Mumbai, for 55 elderly people.
- Indira Gandhi Mahila Vikas Kendra, Marol Pipe Line, J.B. Nagar, Andheri for 35 elderly people
- Gaondevi, Filterpada Mumbai for 40 elderly people

These centres have regular schedules where seniors participate in activities like Yoga, indoor games, music, etc. The facilitators read newspaper articles and organize a moderate discussions on issues like safe drinking water, nutrition in old age, and seniors are encouraged to share stories that they recollect. Seniors were also taken for a day picnic to give them time away from their routine. As a result of these events the seniors report improved mobility and an improved sense of well being.

A general health check-up and pathological checkup of all elderly peoples was organized twice during the year. Seniors requiring further health interventions were identified and assisted in accessing the same.













COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT



Community Development

CASP continued its focus on Water, Environmental Sanitation and Hygiene (WASH) and Water and Environmental Sanitation (WES) during the year.

CASP Mumbai continued with its emphasis on Water and Environmental Sanitation (WES) during the year. Clean communities have been a recurring theme to ensure that children and entire communities have a clean and safe environment. Clean house and clean community competitions continue to be organised in Madh as part of the LTPCT supported Sarvodaya project.



CASP Delhi with the support of HCL Foundation CASP Delhi executed the Project Clean & Green

Khadar, with the objective to develop clean, green and hygienic environment in Madanpur Khadar, make the inhabitants competent to keep their surroundings clean and green and create awareness about environmental issues. A participatory approach was adopted to bring changes in the behavior of the people to achieve the goal. CASP targeted each and every household of Madanpur Khadar, J.J. Colony, approx. 15000 households.

Tree plantation and cleanliness of the parks was conducted by community people and volunteers. To promote interest in kitchen garden CASP Delhi organized training and motivation sessions and provided seeds and pots to identified individuals.





CASP ensures doorstep garbage collection from more than 2000 houses by providing six cycle rickshaws to identified SAFAI MITRA. This has also provided livelihoods to these people. Regular awareness programmes through rallies and community meeting were conducted.

CASP Pune has been implementing the NORMA WASH project in fifty schools across the city and rural areas around. Under the project CASP has completed repairs and renovation of washrooms in twenty five schools and also installed incinerators to destroy sanitary napkins in some schools. Children's clubs are now functional in all schools to involve the children in maintenance of drinking water and washroom facilities.







CASP Gujarat celebrated the birthday of Dr SD Gokhale the Founder President of CASP at Kaththaddhar by planting more than 50 trees. With support of the government Primary school and Green Dream group's Mr Yogesh Joshi, CASP has provided 50 plants to the villages. A session on trees and climate change was also conducted.



CASP Gujarat formed three Village Development Committee in Kathathaddhar, Lakhamsari and Govindpar villages. From the last two years CASP has intervened to assist residents to avail of Govt schemes. 150 applications for support to construct toilets and 160 applications for Shram Yogi card for insurance and medical facility up to Rs 2 Lakh were filled and submitted to concerned department. Three awareness programmes were also organised during the year for 110 members of the VDCs the year and 10 applications were prepared and submitted by the VDCs. under direction of CASP.



CASP Gujarat runs 6 Bal Panchayat Groups in the project area. During the year the Bal Panchayat held regular meetings and participated in various programmes related to child rights. 5 children of the Bal Panchayat group attended a workshop on Child Right audit and then surveyed three selected places of the project area and presented Child right situation at State Level Child Right Consultation arranged by Shaishav under Child Right Collective Gujarat.




CASP-Plan Delhi has taken initiative on WASH (Water, Sanitation and Hygiene) in the community and groups like Green Force and Swachta Samitee has been formed and lot of orientation on water, sanitation and healthy environment were given to them. As a result they were motivated to work as a change agents and now members of Green Force working as change agents through disseminating messages on water sanitation and cleanliness of their surroundings.

Initiative of Plantation was taken by the Green Force members and Swachta samitee members and lot of Plantation was done by their efforts. They have played a positive role for changing the behavior of community people particularly related to cleanliness of their surroundings.









LIVELIHOODS



Livelihoods

Ensuring that the family has a means of earning a decent livelihood with dignity is an important component of ensuring the welfare of children. Increased incomes directly translate to better nutrition, health, educational attainment and future prospects for children. To this end CASP has been implementing numerous programmes for ensuring livelihoods for people in the communities where we work.

CASP Mumbai commenced implementing vocational training programmes in Mumbai in 2009 with support from L&T Public Charitable Trust at Marol Andheri. This process has now grown and LTPCT is supporting CASP run vocational training centres in four locations -Marol (Andheri), Filterpada (Powai) and Majaswadi (Jogeshwari) and Madh Jetty. Tailoring courses run at all centres and an advanced tailoring course is also run at Marol and Filterpada centres where women learn to stitch fancy dresses with flounces, embroidery etc. A beautician course is run at Marol centre, Andheri. A computer basics course is also run at the Marol centres where both boys and girls attend.. The numbers of young people trained over the year are as follows

At Bhandup a tailoring centre supported by Shri Kumaramangalam Birla continues to provide tailoring training to women. During the year 80 women were trained at the centre. These individuals are earning an average of Rs 3000 to 4000.







Wireman Course





CASP Raigad unit is running Vocational training center for women and girls in tailoring at Shirki. During the year 57 women and girls undertook training in basic tailoring. Out of these, 10 to 15 women have started small businesses at home. These women report earning upto Rs. 500- Rs. 700 per month approx. which is an important additional income for their families. The women are also able to save money by stitching their own clothes at home.



The unit also runs Computer classes for children from November 2015. During the period 61 children successfully completed the basic Computer course MS-Office. These vocational centers are funded by Shri. Kumarmangalam Birla.



The unit has provided micro loans to 10 women through the funds of Rs. 50,000/- received from Mr. Sadashiv Gohad. The main objective was to provide financial assistance for small business, work or extra income to make economical sustainability of sponsored family. The unit has provided loan to woman who wants to start/commence some work or extend her ongoing work with financial support as loan without interest to make the woman with the family towards self reliant towards sustainable development. The beneficiaries are regularly repaying the loan amount in instalments every month.





CASP Delhi has supported 19 Self Help Groups (SHG) with 227 members. They deposit their money into a saving scheme, which are deposited in the bank. The savings currently stand at more than Rs 18 lakhs. Loans are sanctioned to the members from time to time and a total of more than Rs 14 lacs has been loaned till now.

SHGs continue to make small items for festive occasions. These items included small oil lamps, savoury eatables, Holi festival colors, table mats, paper bags, jewellery, envelope and files. CASP has marketed these products in HCL campus, local markets and at the individual level. The unit has been organizing trainings and developing marketing strategies for such products

CASP HCL Career Path, 13th November 2016

CASP along with HCL Foundation's support organized a job fair for the youth of Madanpur Khadar on 13th November 2016. Around 200 beneficiaries participated in the event. The main



focus of the job fair was to give the youth an opportunity to choose a better career and direct them towards various skill training courses which have been initiated by the Government of India. The fair was also for those in search of higher education options, which they are not able to assess due to lack proper information & knowledge. Various governments certified organization along with NGO's working in the field of education, vocational & professional courses and companies were invited for the event. A large number of youth had participated in the event and expressed their interest in joining various courses. Through this event they got to know about various vocational courses. Various organizations have been invited for the event. This is just a small step towards the development of the youth and we hope that similar initiatives in the future will also help bridge the unemployment gap that exists in the society.

CASP Delhi, has also been linking the youth of Madanpur Khadar to different skill development courses with the support of IL&FS Institute of Skills & Soft Dot, New Delhi. 30-45 day courses are run as per the demand of the industry and Basic English and computer operations is also taught.

CASP Plan Delhi has been providing support to ensuring livelihoods by diverse means. During the year the unit provided vocational training to 71 girls and 56 boys living in Badarpur area in Customer relations Sales through EMPOWER, a training institute. Of these 72 youth have got jobs in various malls and in companies like BSES,Hero BPO Pvt. Ltd., Goodwill Commodity, M/S Basoya Infrastructure Pvt. Ltd., etc. They are earning between Rs.8000 and Rs. 10000/per month.

Under the Healthy Future for Slum Dweller the unit has also developed a scalable business model in which distribution points providing water filtering and conserving technologies to residents at an affordable and competitive price. A group of 18 women have been identified for training in marketing and entrepreneurship during the year. The process will be taken forward in the next year.

The unit has also trained 102 youth (54 boys and 47 girls) as part of the Saksham Project. These young people are now earning between Rs 5,800 and Rs 16,500 per month

Rajagiri College of Social Sciences OUTReach (the collaboration with CASP) initiated two units of income generating programmes at Edavanakkad and Arattupuzha in May 2015 with the support of TDH Denmark. Each group comprises of 5 members. The groups are doing fish processing. They make dry fish, dry prawn, pickles and sell it into the market and nearby houses.

CASP Gujarat has been running a Tailoring training centre at Lakadia. 107 women were trained in the year 2016-17 where 60 women completed the basic course of 3 months while 57 women went on to undergo another course of advanced training.

CASP Gujarat has been running this center from last 9 years in Project area. A felicitation and certificate distribution programme arranged at Lakhamsari hamlet in the presence of CASP Gujarat Chairperson Dr Binod Chandra Agrawal and Dr. Anil Paranjape – Executive Director CASP along with Education and other Govt Department officials. 372 women who had completed this course were given a certificate of participation in



this course. Today 70 women reported earning Rs 1500 to 7000 per month and supporting family financially and also started some savings.

CASP Gujarat has been implementing the Vagad Mahila Swavalamban Project (VAMASVA) to support women establish or expand their business. With support from Mr Ivan Dalsgaard this project has been providing women with advances from a revolving fund of Rs. 5000 to Rs. 20000. 12 women have benefited from this project during the year and used it for purchase of sewing machine, cloths for selling, establishing a Kitchen Garden etc

CASP Pune Rural unit implements the SAKSHAM initiative, which aims to redefine and enhance livelihood opportunities for victims of commercial sexual exploitation and trafficking (VOCSET) and women affected by AIDS (WAA). This project is funded by Axis Bank Foundation through Plan India and aims at reaching out to up to 5000 beneficiaries in Pune District of Maharashtra State and provide them with sustainable livelihood opportunities. The project forms livelihoods groups of women living in the same area who are organized into joint liability groups (JLGs) of 5-8 members. They are then be assisted in identifying opportunities for livelihood promotion, provided group counselling, aptitude building, monitoring and follow up support. This project will ensure that the children of beneficiaries will have access to adequate nutrition and school education. This in turn will result in prevention of second generation trafficking and HIV. The project is ongoing since May 2012 in 10 blocks of Pune District. Linkages have been built with government officials and non-government organisations and advocacy meetings conducted with medical officers, elected members of local self government bodies and various formal and non formal institutions working at the block & district level.

In the year under review, 101 groups were formed and assistance given to 578 beneficiaries in the form of Revolving Loan Fund. The groups in turn have passed on the assistance @Rs 4000/- per member to 125 beneficiaries & @ Rs.4500/- per member to 453 beneficiaries.

The International Longevity Centre-India (ILC-I)

A number of workshops/consultations, at the regional and national levelsand training programmes for/about senior citizens were organized by ILC-I with a view to orienting senior citizens and other stakeholders in the field of population ageing to a number of relevant issues. Cited below are the most impactful ones of them all-

- An interaction with the Police Commissioner of Pune, Ms. Rashmi Shukla and the senior citizens of Pune city that was organized by ILC-I on the occasion of the World Elder Abuse Awareness Day in June 2016, was the catalyst that led to the formation of "What's app" groups of the leaders of the senior citizens and the designated police officers in charge of the senior citizens, which ensured that the seniors stayed connected with the police 24x7.
- A one day orientation workshop for the senior citizens who volunteer to be a part of the 'Healthy Life for Seniors' project run by the Association of Senior Citizens' Organisations of Pune (ASCOP) was organized by ILC-I in July 2016. These volunteers, who themselves are older persons, ensure that those seniors who live by themselves or with their spouse and are weak, very old, fragile, disabled and /or vulnerable are attended to by the active seniors by providing them with their required medicines, taking them to the doctors or hospitals for consultations or treatments and even giving a patient hearing to their grievances, just being there for them as friends and also counselling.
- A two days' National Consultation on "Challenges and Opportunities before an Ageing Society" held on the 18th & 19th of August 2016, got together the leading experts in this field to discuss this and a Pune Declaration on this was issued and sent to the nodal ministry for ageing in India, the Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment, Govt. of India.
- An innovative two days' workshop, "The Role of Senior Citizens in Maintaining a Green & Sustainable Environment" that needs to be mentioned here is the one held in October 2016, where the office-bearers of 15 senior citizens' organisations (all of which were ILC-I Award winners for having undertaken qualitative work for population ageing), were given training by environmental experts on different subjects like rainwater harvesting, water conservation, solid waste management, recycling, vermicomposting etc. These trained senior citizens went back to their hometowns to undertake at least one initiative there and sent ILC-I a well-documented report on what they had done and its impact. A one day feedback workshop on the 31st of January 2017 three months later got these participants together again to reveal some wonderful initiatives undertaken by them. Their projects were substantial evidence of the potential of Senior citizens utilized to the optimal levels and the best five projects undertaken by the organisations were given special awards.
- Two special lectures by Prof. Dr. DilipSatbhai, the financial expert and Hon. Director, ILC-I, were organized by ILC-I in December 2016 and January 2017, to give information to the senior citizens, on the post-demonetization era that was ushered in by the Indian Prime Minister, Mr. Narendra Modi, on the 8th of November 2016. The lectures were meant to clarify the doubts and queries

- that the seniors had in their minds regarding the financial uncertainty that prevailed then. He spoke on the 'Implications of demonetization & its implications/ramifications with special focus on the elderly.'
- To mark UN's Walk for Water Day of the 22nd of March 2017, 250 senior citizens walked along a 2 kilometers route carrying placards with 'Save water' & 'Conserve Water' messages, and advocating the need for saving water to the residents of the housing societies that they passed by on the roads, followed by a lecture on "Rainwater harvesting."

All the above programmes were supported by Gharda Chemicals Ltd., under CSR support.

TRAINING:

- ILC-I, as the Satellite Centre for the SAARC region of the United Nations' International Institute on Ageing', Malta, conducted a five days' training programme in Mumbai on "Social Gerontology" which was attended by participants from India, Nepal, Sri Lanka and Bangladesh, in April 2016. The Director of UN INIA, Dr. Marvin Formosa and the Programme Officer, Ms. Rosette Bonello were the international faculty along with the resource persons from India, including Dr. Siva Raju, Hon. Director, ILC-I, Ms. Anjali Raje, Executive Director, ILC-I. Certificates were awarded to the participants. The Chairman of ILC-I delivered the Keynote Address at the Inauguration in the TISS Campus, Mumbai. The programme was supported by TISS &BharatiVidyapeeth Deemed University.
- ILC-I conducted a series of 'Mobile Literacy Training Programmes for Senior citizens' very successfully for nearly hundred seniors until now. The objective of this programmewas to train seniors to adapt to a society that is fast moving towards becoming a 'cashless' one, and where financial transactions were becoming electronic and digital. The need now being to making use of the mobile as a 'bank', but the senior citizens today aren't at all comfortable with using the mobile as a medium for financial transactions. So ILC-I organized these training programmes for senior citizens to be mobile-savvy and to help the seniors understand the use of a mobile for more than just receiving and making calls. This project saw the seniors having a special one on one interaction with the trainers and the seniors were very enthused about this new and much-needed learning. This programmewas supported by Gharda Chemicals Ltd., under CSR support.
- ILC-I's VALUEDUCATION programme is an initiative in imparting ethical values and morals to the school children of especially the underprivileged sections of society, and most importantly this is done by senior citizens themselves on a voluntary basis. Values of respect for elders, cleanliness, sanitation, hygiene, honesty, hardwork, integrity, respect for women and many more are imparted to the school children by the senior citizens through non-formal means of education, like singing, dancing, poetry, telling fables, mythology tales and legendary stories etc. Essay competitions are held on topics related to elders/grandparents and the prize-winning essays are given awards. 2500 children from 8 schoolswere covered under this programme. A prize-distribution ceremony was held on the 24th of March 2017 to felicitate the winners of the essay competitions from each of the above schools. This programmewas supported by Gharda Chemicals Ltd., under CSR support.

RESEARCH:

ILC-I conducted a study survey of 250 senior citizens for its study on "Living arrangements and its impact on the health of the elderly." This survey essentially revealed that though, the seniors who lived by themselves or with their spouses were more likely to suffer from physical and mental illhealth (especially, feelings of loneliness & the consequent depression), even those who lived in families, had certain health issues that stemmed from the fact that the family environment was not too congenial for their mental and physical well-being. This was supported by Gharda Chemicals Ltd., under CSR support.

ILC-I AWARDS:

The ILC-I Awards (including the late B. G. Deshmukh and late Dr. S. D. Gokhale Awards) for the year 2016 were given away by the renowned philanthropist and industrialist, Ms. Anu Aga, to the senior citizens' organisations which have done commendable work for the well-being of society in general and/or senior citizens in particular, and to senior citizens over the age of 70 years as a lifetime achievement award. The Anjani Mashelkar Inclusive Innovation Award given annually to scientists/technologists who have developed innovative cost-effective products or services for the elderly, for the year 2016, were given away by Prof Dr. Vikas Baba Amte, the eminent social worker and medical doctor to Mr. Mihir Shah, for his innovative gadget, 'I breast exam' respectively.

International Leprosy Union- Health Alliance

Mahatma Gandhi, Jayprakash Narayan, Pandit Din Dayal Upadhay had told us the concept of Antodaya means the person who is on the last step vulnerable and marginalized should be given priority for development. If they are developed then the development of the society will take place. And then only the country will develop. Sometimes, it takes only a few words spoken in love to bring a person back from the brink. The concept of heredity was deeply rooted, and when leprosy was thought to be inherited, persons with the disease (and their children) were shunned. As deformity was considered divine punishment, stigma was associated with it. Because of associated ideas about heredity and contagion, children and families of persons with leprosy also suffered stigma. Studies found that only about 5% of spouses living with persons with the disease contracted it, making it clear that leprosy was not highly contagious. Leprosy is a disease, which still strikes fear in the societies as a mutilating, disfiguring, contagious and incurable disease. The stigma attached to leprosy leads to loss of employment even before manual labour becomes more difficult due to disability, which often results from late or no treatment. It also leads to exclusion from society, causing physical and emotional distress. Even to this day, when leprosy is completely curable with MDT (multi drug therapy), some parts of India uphold the belief that leprosy is a divine curse, a punishment of the past sins, and a result of immoral sexual behaviour. These beliefs reinforce the image of the "leper' as being physically and morally unclean, to be blamed for contracting the disease and therefore to be ostracized. The repulsive physical image, the fear of infection and the belief that it is incurable are the root causes of the inhuman treatment that is often meted out to those who have leprosy. At all levels of society, leprosy often makes women more vulnerable, socially and economically, than men. Hence gender equity needs equal focus besides reducing stigma and discrimination. We have never considered Leprosy Affected Person is a part of our society. Leprosy attached to the body will be cured by medicine but what about the leprosy of our narrow mind how are we going to eradicate that. I therefore strongly feel that Leprosy Patient should be treated at home and not in the hospital. Due to which the family is not broken. Leprosy is hundred percent curable this scientific truth is also people are not accepting. This is really painful. Government today feels that the Leprosy has been eradicated but the truth is that every year new cases of leprosy are arising. Fear of leprosy like a darkroom where only negatives are developed. Even Doctors are afraid of treating leprosy patient. Government failed to educate these doctors so far. I don't understand how leprosy is counted in terms of percentage. Person who is affected by leprosy is suffered by cent percent stigma. Percentage is a parameter it is a fiction but not a truth, Truth is his stigma which is painful. ILU-HA organize workshop to empower these vulnerable people and create awareness about leprosy the facts and scientific truth to not only Leprosy Affected Persons but also educate general public.
