## From the President's Desk



Dear Friends and colleagues,

To begin I compliment the newly elected Vice President and members of the Governing Council of CASP for their contribution to our organization and the vision for the future.

Child Sponsorship continues to be our mainstay and we continue to work for the underprivileged and marginalized. Our work ensures that these children complete their basic education and some manage to continue in education. To this end we have been working with many agencies to provide financial assistance for education.

The last year has been eventful with CASP undertaking various projects in different locations which have all had a deep and lasting impact on the beneficiaries. In keeping with the agenda of the national government CASP too contributed to the Swachh Bharat mission. In Mumbai (our oldest unit) CASP worked with ten schools in the city and three in Navi Mumbai to improve WASH facilities and create a sense of ownership on the part of the schoolchildren and staff.

Similarly in Pune Unit too CASP worked with twenty schools of the Pune Municipal Corporation to improve the WASH facilities. The project has been markedly successful with the Mayor of Pune calling on all schools to adopt the CASP Model.

In Pune Rural Unit we began phasing out our remedial education programme which worked with more than 3,000 children in 67 schools across Pune District. The purpose of the project was improving reading skills and mathematical concepts.

In Delhi Unit we commenced work in NOIDA where remedial classes for children and a bridge course for women and older girls were commenced. The intervention in a new geography has been challenging but successful.

Also in Delhi our interventions to create an enabling environment for the safety of girls and women by CASP Plan continue apace. Our staff has also been invited to other cities to share their knowledge and help commence similar projects there.

In Raigad Unit apart from the Sponsorship Programme the staff also undertook activities to provide Menstrual Hygiene education. They also worked with mothers to equip them to speak to their children about the issue.

In Gujarat our interventions continued to ensure that girls from rural area continue in education till at least Class 10. To this end the staff worked to create an enabling environment where the education of girl children is the norm rather than an exception.

In 2018 there were unprecedented rains in Kerala. All the staff members had contributed handsomely in raising Rs. 72061. We were able to get additional donations of Rs. 97,500 from a large number of donors. A total of Rs. 1,69,561 were

collected and the money was sent to our Kerala Unit. They have used the money to provide relief to the families of the children sponsored by CASP donors. I would like to sincerely express our thanks to all who have contributed to this effort.

This year there have been unprecedented rains in many parts of Maharashtra. CASP will be carrying out a fund-raising drive to collect funds for providing relief to those affected by the floods. I am certain that we will be able collect significant amount of funds for such a noble cause.

In the years ahead we will continue with our commitment to make India a country where every child has opportunity to develop to the fullest extent.

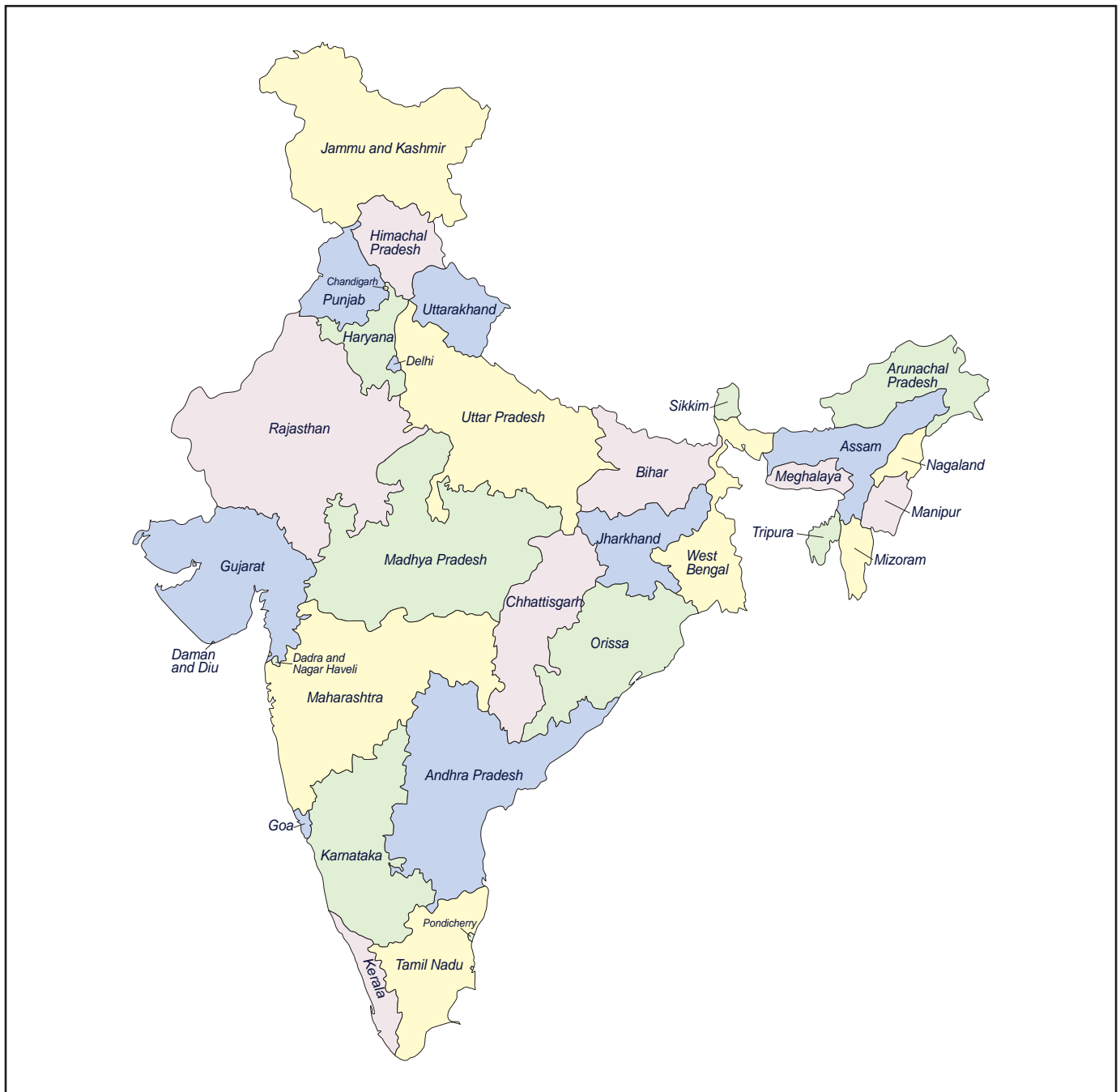

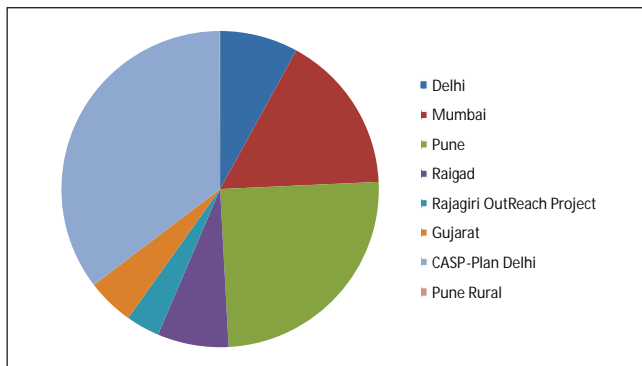

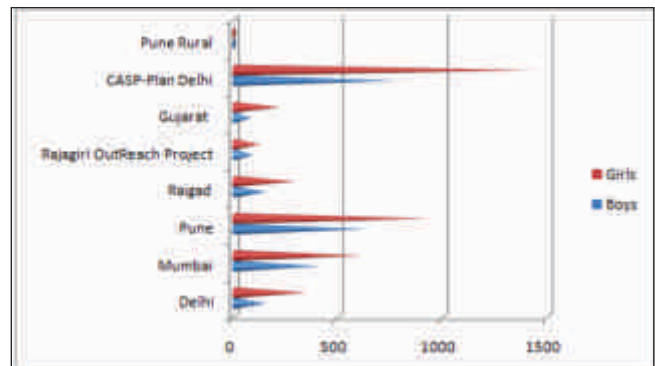
# SPONSORSHIP

Children are encouraged to participate in sports, drama, music, art and other creative endeavours to develop well rounded personalities. This programme is implemented by all units of CASP.

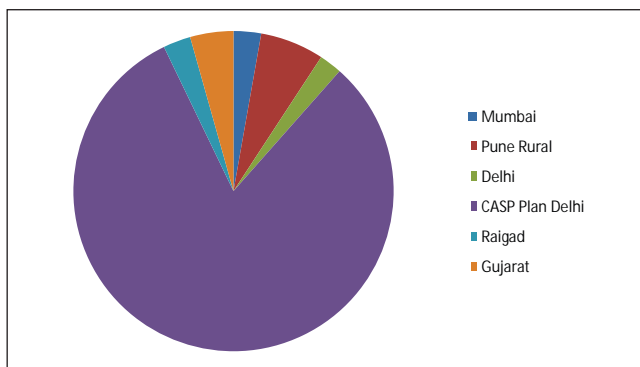




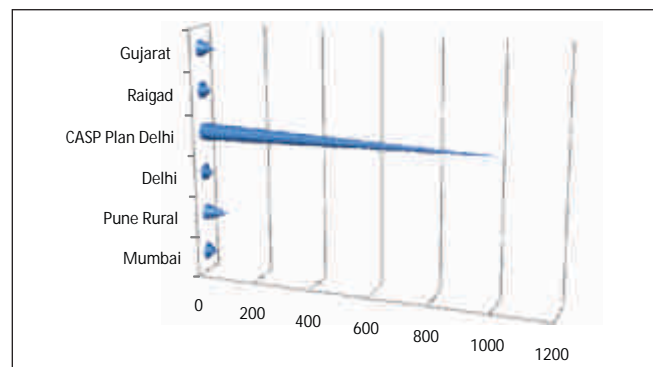
## EARLY CHILDHOOD

The early childhood period is critical for holistic development of children is when there is maximum development of both the minds and bodies of children. Children at this age require stimulation for proper development apart from health related inputs. Further at this age it is for the caregivers to provide children with appropriate inputs. Therefore CASP implements the Early Childhood Care and Development programmes with a primary focus of working with caregivers and ensure that children receive appropriate care.

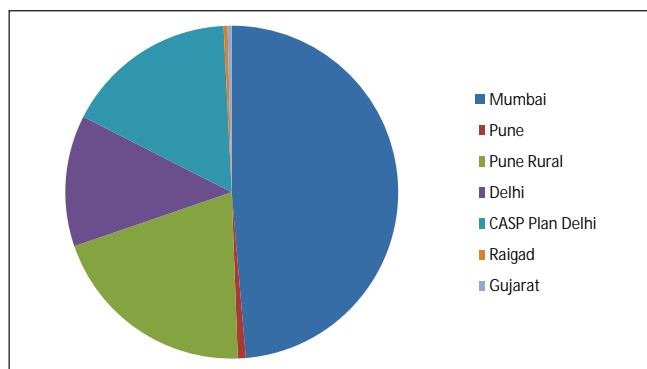
# EDUCATION

The mainstay of CASPs vision and mission is human development, primarily of children. CASP recognises that education is one of the building blocks that will help all children take their position in the globalised world. Thus many of the programmes implemented by CASP are focused on ensuring that children obtain a good education in an enabling environment.

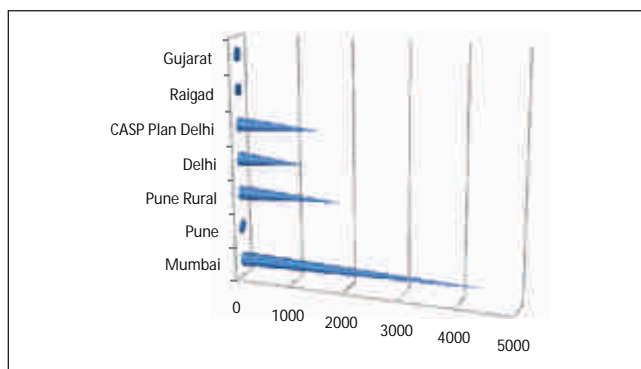
Educated mothers can play a critical role in ensuring that children do not drop out of school. However many women particularly from rural areas are uneducated and have not able to complete their school education. CASP also attempts to ensure that they are provided an opportunity to complete their education.

Similarly women and some young people from marginalised communities are getting left behind in the digital revolution. CASP is therefore working to ensure that these women and young people are given the opportunity to be digital literate.

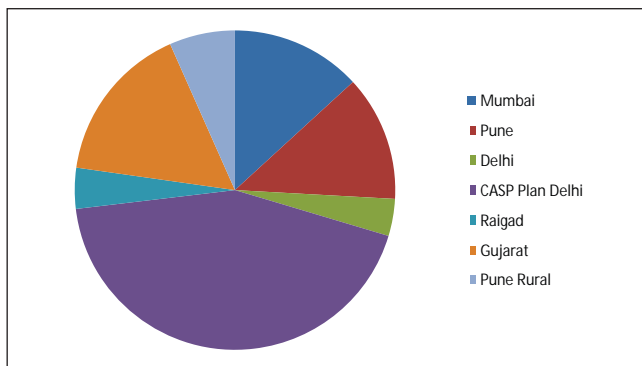




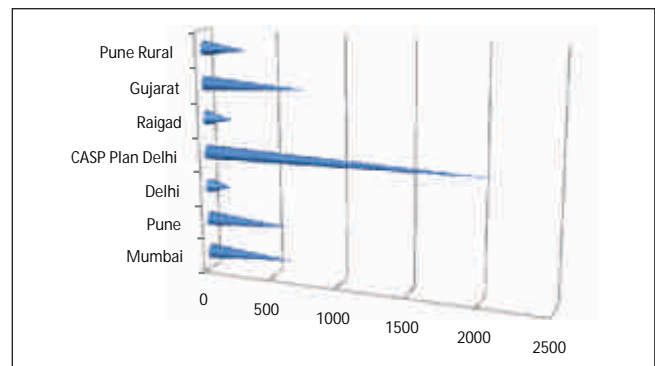
# HEALTH

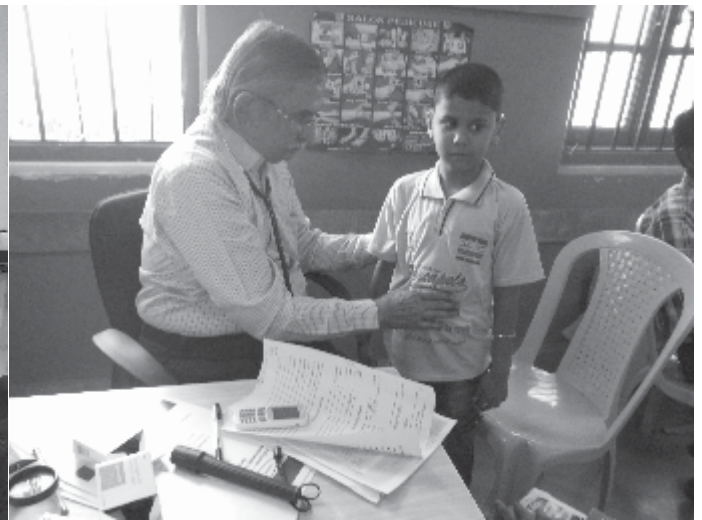

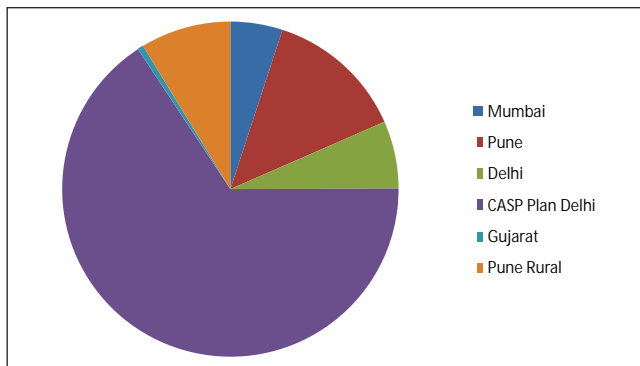

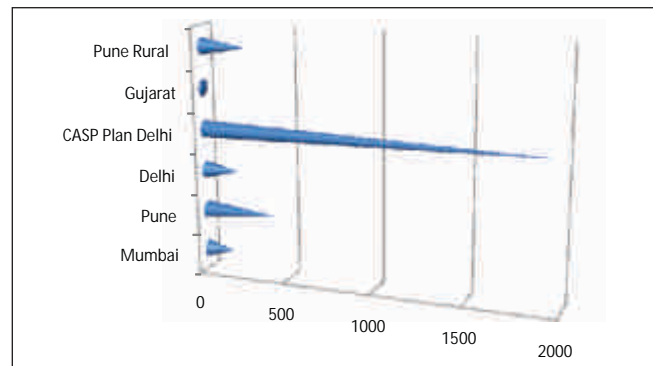
## ADOLESCENTS

Adolescents are currently the most important demographic in the country. More than 25 % of the population of India is currently less than 25 years of age and if we are able to utilise the skills, energies and abilities of this huge number of people who are about to enter the work force we would be able to expand our economy many times over. CASP too is seized of this imperative and has been working with adolescents for many years now. This age group is particularly vulnerable and requires programmes specially designed to address their concerns.

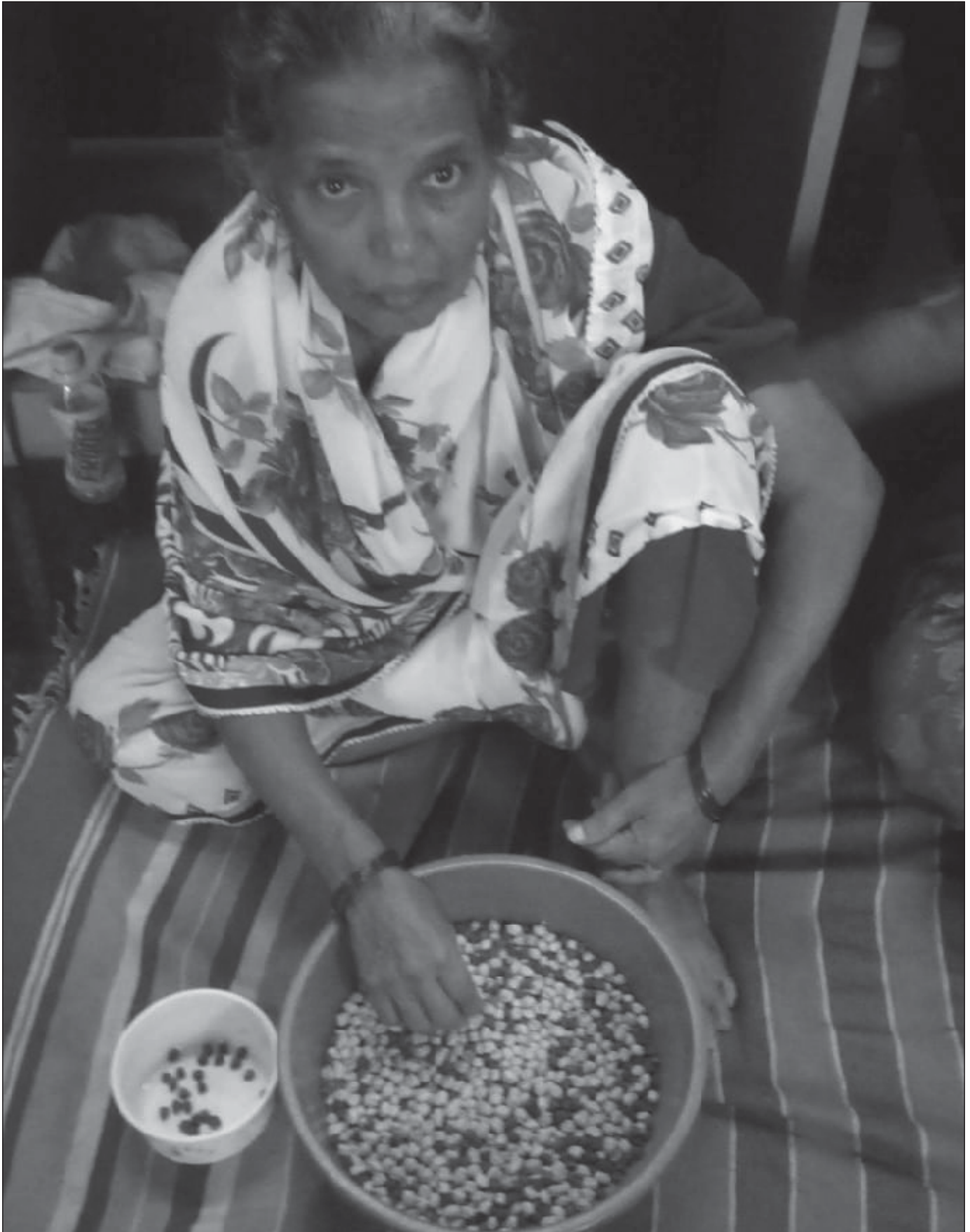

## SENIOR CITIZENS

Senior Citizens are an invaluable asset in any society. This is even more so in societies where women also participate in the labour force and thus grandparents are often the primary care givers for children. Even apart from this the respect accorded to seniors in our society ensures that their opinions are heard and respected. Seniors thus can be agents of societal change and also islands of stability in times of turbulence.

120 Senior Citizens benefit from the Project

CASP recognizes the importance of seniors within communities and families particularly with reference to children. Far too often seniors in poor communities tend to feel that they are a burden on their families as they are no longer economically productive. They thus wander around the streets or sit outside their homes. They also tend to neglect their health. In order to intervene in this situation CASP implements Senior Citizens Centres with the following objectives: -

- 1) To maintain health of elderly people
- 2) To provide psychological support to elderly people
- 3) To engage the elderly with current developments.

This project is implemented in Mumbai where 120 senior citizens are provided support through three centres.







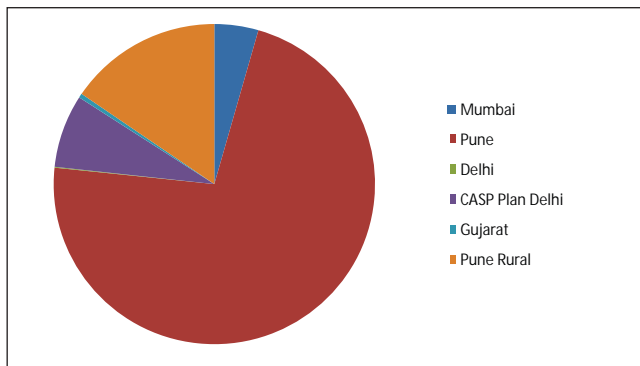

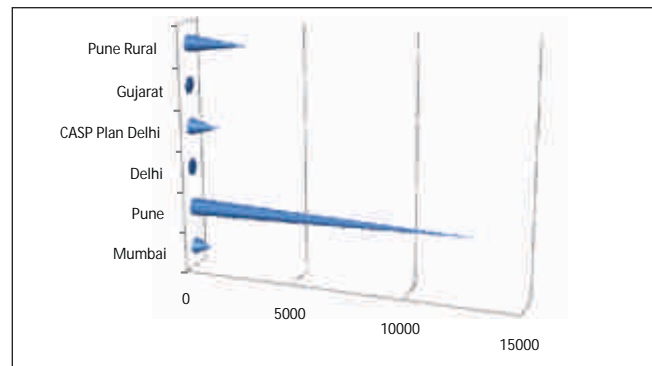

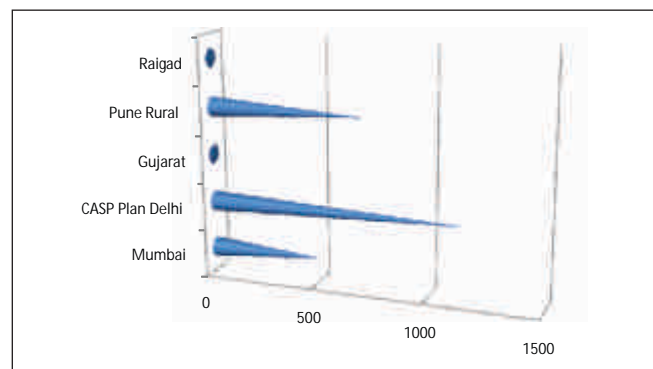
Ensuring that the family has a means of earning a decent livelihood with dignity is an important component of ensuring the welfare of children. Increased incomes directly translate to better nutrition, health, educational attainment and future prospects for children. To this end CASP has been implementing numerous programmes for ensuring livelihoods for people in the communities where we work.

Providing people with Job Oriented Vocational Training is an initiative that CASP has taken up at various times in the past and is also undertaking similar programmes currently. Further CASP has also been providing women with micro-loans to enable them to establish and strengthen their businesses.

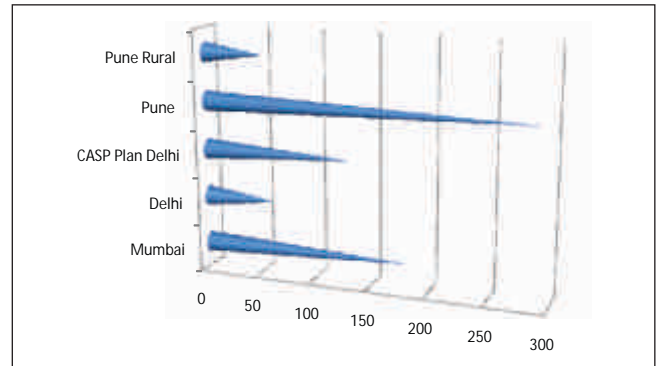
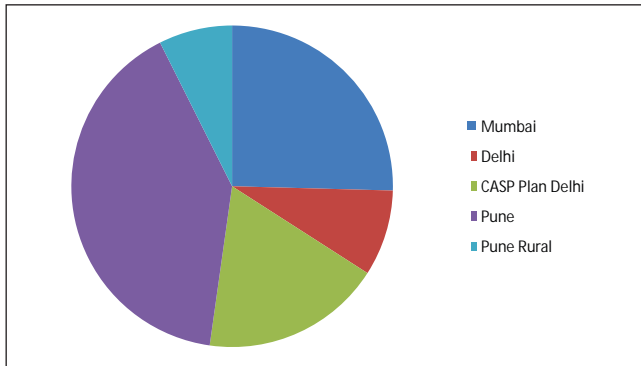

## Success Stories Sponsored Children

(Kavita- AC International (DIA) was being supported by AC International since she was studying in the 5th standard. Kavita and her family used to stay in Nehru Place, however the family had been relocated the Madanpur khadar during the resettlement phase. At that time her father who used to work as a laborer was not earning much. The family consisted of 6 people and managing the children's education was not easy for her father.

Kavita says that her life changed when she was enrolled in the sponsorship programme. Due to the support received from CASP she never had to buy uniform and stationery till she completed her schooling, which eased the burden of her parents to some extent. Kavita also got opportunities to participate & showcase her talent at various sports, cultural events which were organized by CASP on a regular basis. She also got to visit CASP's Head office where she got an opportunity to present the work that is being done in the community of Madanpur khadar by CASP. She was also elected as the President of the Bal Panchayat and she also got opportunities to solve various issues with other children. She credits CASP for her overall development. She and her family are always indebted to CASP for the support she received .

Presently Kavita is pursuing M.A and his working as Team Leader at Kidzania which is a theme park. She has been earning Rs.17,500 and is supporting her parents and her education. She informed us that she too would like to support a needy child in future.

Shyam Sunder who was being supported by EDM France. During the time of enrollment he was in the 2nd standard His financial condition was not good and it was difficult for his father to take care of his & his siblings education. The family had been relocated from Govindpuri. Shyam too was not very interested in studies and used to spend his time with children who used to loiter around. His parents were also very worried about him. However with regular counseling and support from CASP, he started taking interest in his studies and also participated in various activities like exposure visits, rallies, theatre, and different other workshops which were held from time to time. By participating in all these activities his life changed for the better. His academic performance also improved and he passed class 10th & 12th with 75% & 71% respectively .

While pursuing graduation he also started working as a field mobilizer during which he could support his college studies and also contributed financially to his family. After completing his graduation in Commerce he got a job as an Accounts Assistant with an C.A firm. While working he also managed to complete his MBA in Finance . Today he is working as an Accounts' executive with Singer India Pvt Limited. At present he is earning 22,000/- . He is able to support his family.



## Sister Organisations - Brief Report of International Leprosy Union

International Leprosy Union is working hard to create awareness about Leprosy but our NGO has limitations in creating awareness about Leprosy mainly due to paucity of funds, we could not organize workshops and seminars in the endemic area of the country. However, whenever we received the fund, we organize seminars and workshops in endemic districts of Uttar Pradesh I. E: in Lucknow, Ambedkarnagar, Bahairich, Lakhimpur Khiri, Shravasti and in endemic states like Bihar, Jharkhand, Chhatisgad, Orissa. But this is not enough and we have to create campaign like Polio eradication through out the country by giving advertisements and jingles in the electronic media and newspapers. Of Course, like Polio no vaccine has been developed so far, no doubt lot of research work is going on. Therefore, creating awareness, early detection and medical treatment is the only remedy to keep this disease under control. Unfortunately, Leprosy is making come back in India, But Government want to deny it. Under pressure to eliminate leprosy, the Government is unwilling to record new cases. Social stigma and failure to detect cases early are hurdles in eradicating the disease. 13 years ago, when India announced that leprosy had been eliminated as public health concern. Alarm bells rang as the Central Leprosy Division of health ministry reported that 135485 new leprosy cases were detected in India in 2017. We are trying to pursue government, we have sent proposals to organize workshops in various states like Maharashtra, Rajasthan, Punjab, Haryana Chhatisgad etc but there is no response from any of the states. Now we are running two Child Development centres in Anandvan Leprosy colony Dapodi and Meghajibhai Leprosy Colony in Miraj Dist. Sangli. With the financial assistance of Venkeys India Pvt Ltd. Both the centres are running nicely.

## Sister Organisations - ILC

The International Longevity Centre-India (ILC-I) is a not-for-profit Section 8 company (under the Indian Companies Act 2013), working for the cause of population ageing since 2003.

It was founded by the late Dr. S. D. Gokhale, eminent social scientist. The present President of ILC-I, since 2008, is the internationally renowned scientist, Padma Vibhushan Dr. R. A. Mashelkar. The Chairman of ILC-I is Mr. Jayant Umranikar, the former Director-General of Police, Maharashtra.

ILC-I is a member of the Global Alliance of the International Longevity Centres, which has, besides India, 15 other countries as its members. As a member of the Global Alliance of the International Longevity Centres, ILC-I enjoys Special NGO Consultative Status with UNESCO.

ILC-I is also privileged to be recognised as the United Nations' International Institute on Ageing, Malta's Satellite Centre for the SAARC region.

Under its programmes –

ILC-I runs the Value Education programme where underprivileged school children are taught morals and values through a non-formal means of education by senior citizens over the age of 60 years. These children from standards 5 to 7 are taught about respect for elders and women, about sanitation, cleanliness, hygiene, (part of the SWACHH BHARAT ABHIYAN), water conservation and other environmental issues, about hard work, honesty etc, by the seniors who tell stories, fables, legendary tales, mythological stories, sing songs and recite poems and even through dance, cartoon films etc.

Later, ILC-I holds painting competitions where children are encouraged to paint their thoughts on the values that they have learnt through this programme and there is a prize distribution for all the participating schools at the end of the academic year for the award-winning drawings from each standard of each school.

This programme essentially makes the senior citizens feel productive and participatory in a qualitative way in the development of society.

Through its Mobile Literacy Training programmes, ILC-I teaches the senior citizens on how to use the mobile phones for purposes other than just making calls. Senior citizens are taught by the ILC-I team to make online payments for their utility services, to book tickets for their travel, to book cabs, use the phone for procuring information and entertainment and much more.

This empowers the senior citizens to be independent and more confident in their daily lives.

ILC-I Awards- These Awards are given every year to senior citizens' organisations which have done commendable work for the development and well-being of not just senior citizens but also of society in general and also to a journalist who advocates the cause of population ageing through either the print or electronic media.

There is a set of Awards that are given to senior citizens over the age of 70 years for their outstanding lifetime achievements and work done.

Physiotherapy Assessment Camps for Senior Citizens-

ILC-I began conducting Physiotherapy Assessment Camps for the elderly with the support of Gharda Chemicals Ltd., for senior citizens since August 2018, in collaboration with Deccan Education Society's Brijlal Jindal College of Physiotherapy. Nearly 800 senior citizens have benefitted from this initiative for their physical well-being.

ILC-I works to empower the senior citizens to lead healthy, qualitative, productive and participatory lives as it believes in Celebrating Age and Creating a Society for All Ages.
