From the President's Desk



Dear friends and colleagues,

The annual report of CASP for the year 2013-2014 is in your hands. You will notice that this year we have a new layout and format which we hope will encourage you to engage with us and gain more of an insight into our work. This is due to the efforts made by two batches of interns from the management students of the SP Jain Institute of Management Studies who prepared this for us. I write to express my gratitude to them for their efforts.

In this report we present an overview of the activities CASP undertook to express our commitment to the development of children, their families and communities across various parts of India where we work. The focus areas have remained education, health, and livelihoods for the underprivileged. The creation and support of strong communities also remains one of our key result areas, communities that are engaged and committed to providing a better tomorrow for their children while they also strive to become more self-reliant.

Our employees remain the main stay of our programmes and compensating them adequately for their contribution is an important incentive. During the year CASP implemented a revision of pay scales for our employees after a gap of more than a decade. I am proud to say that we are now totally compliant with the Minimum Wages Act. We are also working towards introducing best practices for human resource management in CASP. I am certain this will reduce attrition while also enhancing our attractiveness to new talent. Further we also conducted in-house training programmes and deputed employees to attend training programmes conducted by other organizations, in order to enhance the skills of our employees by.

CASP Mumbai unit has continued with its vocational training primarily with the assistance provided by L & T Public Charitable Trust (LTPCT). These programs have now created a large workforce in Mumbai with necessarily skills in computer operations, sewing and beauty care. During the year the unit also enhanced its work with communities by implementing a programme for community development in Filterpada in Powai. This programme too is supported by L&T PCT, and in the current year we are in the process of expanding our initiative to other areas in Mumbai specifically along the Jogeshwari – Vikhroli Link Road.

CASP Pune unit continued implementing the program on Health for Urban Poor with support from PLAN India and USAID. This program has resulted in sustainable systems and processes where communities are now engaging with the Pune Municipal Corporation. The unit also encouraged the formation of a childrens co-curricular activity group entitled the CASP Kalarang Group. The group staged a programme of dance and drama and encouraged children to explore their talents.

CASP PLAN Delhi unit has been working in various resettlement colonies of South Delhi. Their programmes focussed on protection of the rights of children have been very well received and appreciated.

CASP Gujarat Unit expanded its reach in the current year by implementing a project for HIV awareness in Anjar area. This programme is supported by Gujarat State AIDS Control Society. Their work with children and women continues to be among the very few development works in this rather under-served area of Gujarat.

CASP Delhi Unit continued its work with residents of the resettlement colony in Madanpur

Khaddar and received encouraging support from HCL Trust. Their work with children and garbage collection is remarkable. The children have formed a Bal Panchayat that is effectively providing them with a platform to engage the community to realise their rights. Their efforts towards disposal of garbage provide a model for environmental sanitation that also provides employment and I look forward to this being scaled up in the days ahead.

CASP Raigad Unit continued its work with tribal community in Raigad District of Maharashtra to increase access to government services. During the year the unit liaised with agencies to concentrate their efforts on this process and assisted the residents to engage with elected representatives and government officials to ensure that their basic documentation was received and access to the public distribution system was facilitated.

CASP Pune Rural Unit continued with its focus on prevention of transmission of HIV and also increasing income for marginalised women. These efforts will go a long way in ensuring the next generation of these areas are healthy and able to achieve an optimal education. The programme for rural development undertaken in Khed Taluka of Pune District with generous support from Tata Capital has been concluded after three years of intervention. The progress was not as expected but the programme resulted in our organisation gaining valuable experience.

The rights based approach of CASP continues to ensure that the needs of the underprivileged child are directly addressed. CASP is implementing programs in four states at eight locations, with no regard to caste, colour, race, religion or beliefs. In these locations our dedicated and committed staff, with the generous support of our donors and volunteers are successfully implementing various programs in both urban and rural areas. During the year we have supported young people to take their education forward, provided the elderly with psycho-social support, educated communities about the importance of nutrition and also provided nutritional support and also provided children with means for the development of their talents.

A special mention must be made of Mr Nitin Naik a long standing supporter of CASP who in the past few years has been reaching out to his friends and relatives to spread the message of CASP and encouraging them to in turn also support the work of CASP. This one individual with his selfless dedication is now ensuring that more than a hundred children are being supported due to his efforts.

During the year the senior management of TdH Denmark which is a major donor of CASP, visited our units. They are now in the process of raising more funds for our organisation and we appreciate their assistance.

There have been instances where the donations from certain sponsors have not been received in time. In such cases CASP, as an organisation dedicated to the welfare of children who have already been enrolled in the sponsorship programme has continued sponsorship from our own resources. While I understand that sponsors would have their reasons for ceasing their support we would appreciate if they could communicate their inability to support children well in time to enable us to make alternate arrangements for the continued support of the children.

I take this opportunity to thank all the staff, donors, volunteers, members of CASP and partnering organizations for having been a part of this wonderful journey. We hope you will continue to participate in the years ahead and take us towards a brighter future.

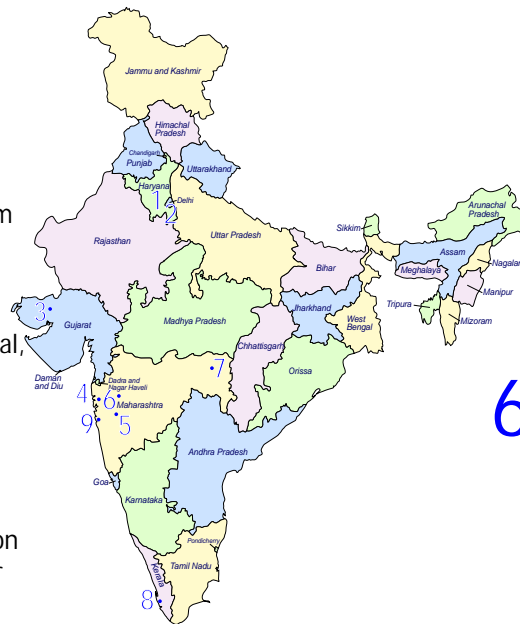

CASP - At a Glance

Community Aid & Sponsorship Programme (CASP), a non Government, not-for-profit organization has been working across several states of India for almost four decades. The primary goal of the organisation is to provide underprivileged children with development opportunities.

CASP is governed by a group of eminent professionals from diverse fields, designated as the Governing Council. This body decides policies and guides the organization's workforce. The Governing Council meets at least twice a year and adopts a hands-on approach. The council reviews the programmes, the performances of the budget of each unit and also the utilization of funds during these meetings.

CASP is committed to engaging with the community in a participatory manner to assess development needs and implement programmes. Through the sponsorship programme the organisation has been successful in reaching out to underprivileged children, their families and the communities where live.

CASP facilitates, and in some cases actually provides, opportunities for children to access education, health, recreation, and later in life, livelihoods. But above all the organisation aims to prepare them to take on the challenges of life and participate in the development of India.

CASP collaborates with individuals and organisations that are willing to make a long term commitment and share our vision of developing self reliant communities where children are able to realise their rights. These include state governments and several national and international organizations both Non Profits and commercial establishments. Some of these partnerships have been in place for years while others are more recent partnerships. Apart from these organisations CASP is also supported by individuals both in India and abroad who believe in the ability of CASP to change lives and thus provide assistance in their individual capacity. We are grateful for the support from all our individual and organisational partners.

CASP implemented a variety of projects in the year 2013-2014 with a view to address locally relevant issues affecting children and their communities at multiple locations. A bouquet of programs for children were implemented including Early Childhood Care and Education, support for mainstream education, health initiatives particularly directed towards reproductive and child health (with a special focus on adolescent health) including HIV/AIDS awareness, increasing opportunities for livelihoods and community development. The programmes for community development focussed on sanitation, habitat, access to services and care for the elderly. This year too we continued to focus on the participation of the common man in governance by engaging with the administration on the implementation of government programmes. Livelihood programmes were primarily directed towards women and youth, to ensure social justice and economic and social empowerment.

CASP has been focussing on the participation of children by empowering them and facilitating their inclusion in decision making and the monitoring of programmes. CASP believes that every child must be aware of her/his rights and the means to obtain and defend them. Bal Panchayats (Child councils) and Bal Sabhas (Children meetings) have been encouraged at every location where the organisation is working. Children are members of these bodies which diagnose community issues and participate in the resolution of the same. The children are personally instrumental in organizing workshops, meeting with decision makers and mobilizing resources. In a true sense this is a children's movement.

CASP has encouraged the participation of the communities not only as recipients of the services it offers, but as equal decision makers in planning, implementation and gradually increasing ownership of the projects. The thrust on encouraging the community, especially women, to form Community Based Organizations (CBOs) in all the locations where CASP works, is an ideal example of the focus on community involvement. Today the volunteer base from the community is the back bone of our programs. It is this partnership with the communities that has helped create a sustainable resource at all our program locations, both present and past.

CASP works through eight Units. Of these, four are in Maharashtra – Mumbai with a sub unit at Nagpur, Raigad District, Pune (Urban), and Pune (Rural). There are also two units in Delhi – CASP Delhi Unit and CASP Plan Unit and one in Kerala



(in collaboration with the Rajagiri College of Social Sciences), and in Gujarat at Kutch. Each unit has a set of activities which are based on the needs of the local community. Thus the organisation implements multidimensional programmes.

Each unit team is led by a Project manager and advised by a Chairperson. Efforts of all the team members at all locations deserve kudos for their dedication, perseverance and 'let's do it' attitude.

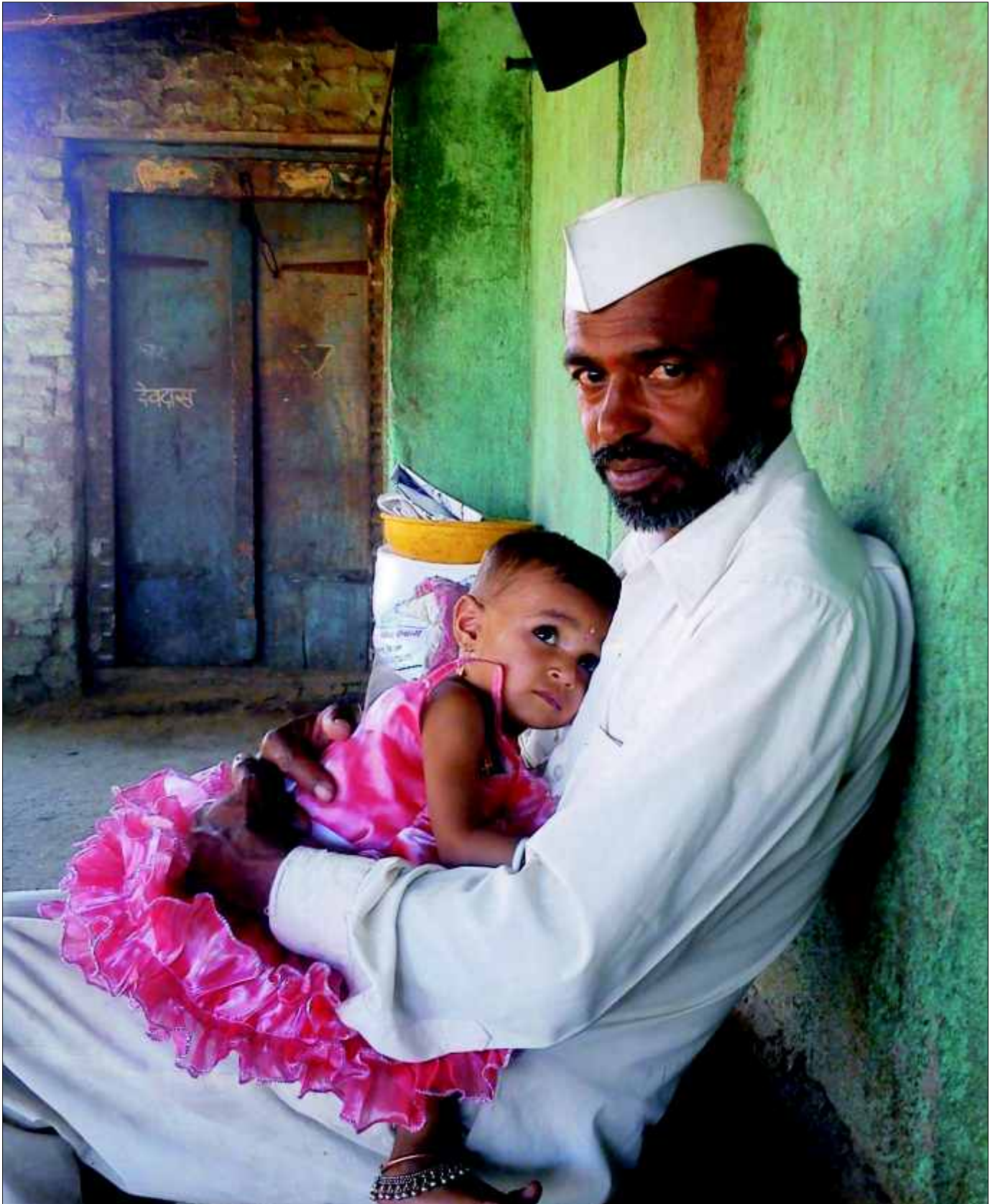

EARLY CHILDHOOD CARE AND DEVELOPMENT

EARLY CHILDHOOD CARE AND DEVELOPMENT (ECCD)

CASP works towards early childhood care and development with a view to socialize children and prepare them for the school years ahead. To this end, CASP implements various programmes.

CASP PLAN DELHI

The unit works with children below the age of two years to create awareness among parents and provide them with information. 30 community volunteers have been trained to work as ECCD communicators in the community. Each communicator has identified 50 families who have child below the age of two years. They make home visits, conduct meetings and training sessions with these families. During these meetings the communicators discuss various issues such as holistic development of the child-development milestones, breast feeding and nutrition, immunization, growth monitoring etc with the parents. 120 training sessions for parents were conducted during the year. These sessions were on various issues including child rearing practices, immunization, nutrition, psycho-social development of the child, child right and child protection. Eight male awareness camps were organized in the community to sensitize fathers to their role and responsibilities in ECCD and 225 fathers attended these camps. Eight healthy baby shows were organized in the community to encourage parents and volunteers at community level to address the issues child development and child protection. About 300 families participated in these shows.

A training programme was also organized for the ECCD communicators on protection from diseases "Mera Surksha Ghera". In this session the communicators were informed about child right, child participation and child protection. About 35 women attended the training but 5 drop out after the training and 30 women are continuing with us.

CASP MUMBAI UNIT

CASP Mumbai Unit runs a Balwadi for children of age group between 3 and 5 years at Indira Gandhi Mahila Vikas Kendra, Andheri. Twenty two children attended pre-school (Balwadi) during the last year and seven children who were eligible have now taken admission in Class I in recognized schools. The Balwadi teacher teaches with play way methodology.

CASP DELHI UNIT

CASP Delhi unit runs a Balwadi centre which is supported by AC International Child Support, Denmark (Development Fund). 40 children of age group of 3 to 5 years were enrolled in this preparatory school during the year. Activities for physical, mental and social development of the children were conducted to enhance their motor skills, coordination, visual learning and speech. During the year the children were also taken on a picnic where they were taken to Children Park, Doll Museum, Rail Museum etc. 30 of the children of the balwadi were eligible for enrolment in Class I and all of them are now attending regular school.



CASP GUJARAT UNIT

During the year the Gujarat unit supported the government Anganwadi workers in Lakhamsari, Lakadiya, Badargadh and Kathathddhar for the enrollment and regular attendance of the children. The unit also engaged in advocacy with the Municipal councilor in Rapar Nagarpalika for the ICDS Centre (Anganwadi) in Kathathaddhar area of Rapar town. So far the Anganwadi was running in a room of the primary school. The unit was successful in obtaining the sanction for construction work of the separate structure for the anganwadi which is now in progress.

CASP RAIGAD UNIT

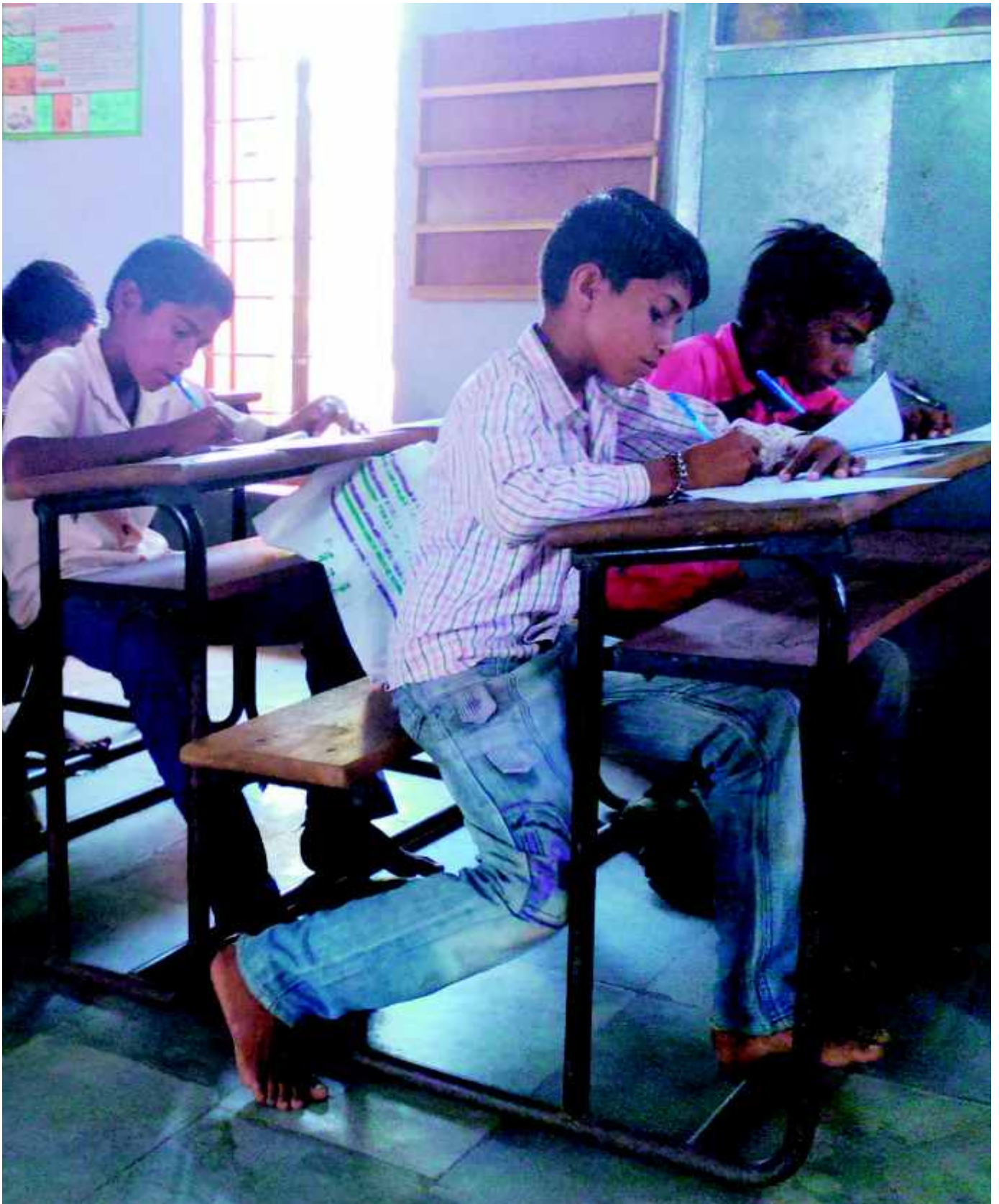
CASP Raigad unit is running three Balwadis with support from Enfant Du Monde France. These balwadis cater to 90 children across all three sites. All the children have been provided with educational aids and are also provided a nutritious mid-day meal every school day. In December and January all the children underwent a medical check-up and were also given deworming tablets.



Children's day was celebrated in all the three day care centers of Shirki, Gorthan & Narangi between 18th to 22nd November 2014. The children participated in various games and competitions arranged and relished on the pav bhaji and sweet given to them.

Various children of Day care center also participated in the cultural programmes held during the annual felicitation & get together of sponsored children.





EDUCATION

EDUCATION

The core programme activities of CASP are related to education. We at CASP look at education as a basic right of all children and work to ensure that every child completes her education at least till Class X. To this end CASP implements the sponsorship programme in which a child is supported by a sponsor. All the units of CASP implement the sponsorship programme and provide support to a total of 9275 children across the states where we work.

The interventions implemented by the units include provision of tangible benefits such as uniform, stationery, note books, shoes & socks, school & tuition fee to the sponsored children according to assessed needs of each individual child. CASP also organizes activities targeted at developing the child in various ways by providing them with opportunities to participate in different fora. Exposure visits are organized for sponsored children to enhance their knowledge as well as to providing them an opportunity to enjoy. An important aspect of the sponsorship programme of CASP is that counseling of children and their parents is regularly conducted to ensure that the importance of education is appreciated by all and the child continues in education.

In addition all the units also conduct various activities for the overall development of the children. Workshops are conducted to enable the children to learn various skills, crafts and to provide them with an opportunity to explore their talents. This is done with the objective of ensuring that the children grow into well rounded individuals and also to ensure that only scholastic performance is not regarded as the benchmark for the development of a child.

CASP PLAN DELHI

CASP Plan Delhi implements various projects in the field of education. In order to improve the quality of education, CASP-Plan Delhi worked with ten Municipal Corporation of Delhi primary schools. Meetings were conducted with teachers, children and their parents and a school Improvement plan was developed for each school. Needs that were identified included renovation of toilet complexes and drinking water facility. It was also realized that training for teachers on RTE, Child Protection, and Positive Discipline is needed. Subsequently trainings were organized for the teachers and an exposure visit was also organized to see the best practices in other schools. Children's groups (Sadan) were formed in all the schools and regular meetings were conducted with the children to familiarise them with child the rights and children's participation in school activities. Through the year 400 children participated in these meetings.



CASP RAIGAD

CASP Raigad unit is running a study centre at Gorthan since 2009. Currently 35 children attend this centre and are provided with remedial and support classes. Periodic tests are also conducted to evaluate the performance of the children by the study centre teacher.

CASP Raigad unit organised a one day guidance seminar for the Xth std. children on 13th November 2013 to provide them with advice on appearing for the board exams. 85 children from Kandale, Kandalepada, Shirki, Vavoshi, Gorthan & Narangi participated in the seminar. Three teachers of Maths, Science and English (Mrs. Phadnis, Mrs. Patwardhan and Mr. Phatak) provided advice on preparations of exams, study of



difficult subjects, entering personal information in the answer sheets etc. The teachers also spoke of the importance of time management, practice, mental and physical relaxation & fitness etc. During the year 40 sponsored children appeared for their Class X exams and 38 have passed.

Apart from these children CASP Raigad also supports 9 children who are undergoing higher education with support from AC International Child Support Denmark (Meritorious Students Project). These students are provided with support for tuition fees, coaching class fees etc.



CASP Raigad arranged a felicitation programme for sponsored children and their families on 1st February 2014. Mrs Pritam Patil President, Pen Municipal Corporation and Mr. Subodh Joshi District Governor Rotary Club were the Guests of Honour. Ms Sudha Joshi presided over the function where more than 400 sponsored children and their families, who had come from remote parts of Raigad district, participated. During the event Ms. Hemangi Kadam who was supported by CASP in the past and is now a school teacher shared her appreciation of the organisation. The same is also included at the end of this Report.

CASP Raigad unit arranged an excursion for 55 children from villages of Pen, Amtem, Irwadi & Kandalepada, on 16th November 2013 to Panoramic Resorts (Papillon resorts), Kalhe phata Tal Panvel. CASP Raigad unit arranged a New Year Fun fair party for 87 children and their siblings on 20th January 2014. This was organised with the support of Mr. Nitin Naik and his friends who are sponsoring more than 90 children of Raigad unit.



CASP DELHI

CASP Delhi runs a remedial education centre for the sponsored children, where 90 children from class 1st to 5th attend either before or after school hours from 9 am to 5 pm. These children are divided in six class wise batches.

Similarly after school supplementary education classes for students of class 6th to 10th are run with the support of HCLT foundation. During the year 280 students were enrolled and subject expert teachers help them with difficult subjects like English, Math and Science.



CASP Delhi runs a Sports Club where 240 children and youth play and learn their favorite sports;

Cricket, Football, Badminton, Kho-Kho, Chess and Carom are very popular games. Around 100 members are very regular and have also participated in various state level competitions.

The Delhi unit also maintains a library to provide underprivileged children the enjoyment of reading and the excitement of discovering knowledge and works of imagination. On an average day 100 children visit the library and read books, news paper, magazines and browse the internet. Children find easy to work on the projects assigned by school as compared to the past when they had very few resources. It is a matter of immense pride for us that parents are also willing to let their daughters visit the centre. In Delhi it is common for the parents to screen every facility and there is usually a lot of reluctance to send daughters anywhere apart from school. However, due to the long years of activity and confidence which has now developed, parents allow their girls who in turn find it convenient to get books and to use the internet service while feeling quite safe.

Center for School Dropout Programme for Women (CASP & HCLT Initiative)

On 7th December 2013, CASP inaugurated its continued adult education program for the women of Madanpur Khadar with the assistance of HCL Technologies. This innovative program is aimed at helping women and girls who have not been able to complete their formal education. The reasons for women dropping out of education include challenges with regard to finances, social norms and restrictions. The program caters to 53 women, 15 women enrolled in Class 5, 21 enrolled for class 8 and 17 enrolled in Class 10. This program will assist them to register for the exams for the National institute of Open Schooling (NIOS) provide them with support classes and also organize transport to the exam centre which is some distance away.



In addition adult education classes are also conducted under the Gender Resource centre supported by the Delhi Government. 70 women attended these classes during the year.

Self Defence Training

Providing girls with the skills to defend themselves is an essential component of increasing their self confidence. To this end CASP Delhi organized a self defence training programme from 21st May to 15th June 2013 with Delhi Police. Mr. Arvind Kumar, S.H.O. Jaitpur, police staff (both male and female) and the participated and 80 girls are participated

An additional benefit of the programme was that this has created a link between the police administration and community children. In the future we plan to increase this linkage and ensure that the fear of the police is removed and the community is able to identify the police as people who are there to help them. It is also expected that the training certificate will help the children to join N.C.C, Police and as Games teachers.



School Visits

The unit undertook school visits to assess the performance of the children in school and also to include the schools and teachers into this programme. Through these visits, the performance of each student could be assessed on an individual level and also helps to undertake a regular monitoring system. During the reporting period the social workers visited the respective schools twice a year. Through these visits it is also ensured that the sponsored children get special attention from the teachers.



Parents' meetings were conducted once in 3 months and issues such as parenting, adolescent behaviour, child rights, entrepreneurship, etc were taken up in these meetings. These meetings provided the parents with an opportunity to express their views, concerns and expectations. Similarly children's meeting was conducted on all 2nd Saturdays, of the month, with the aim of developing their extracurricular activities, skills etc. A review of academic performance of the children is also undertaken during these meetings and curricular activities, social and leadership skills and personality development activities are also undertaken.

CASP MUMBAI

CASP Mumbai Unit (with support from Give India) has been supporting 100 marginalized girls from the Worli slums to complete their education. Of these 29 girl children have shown an improved scholastic performance and while 63 girl children have maintained it. Only 8 girl children have displayed a



performance that was below average. Among these are some girls who are also studying in college and Ruchita Saroj scored 78% in her first year of B Sc – Computer Science, Priyanka Raghunath Patil is in her first year of B. Sc. Nursing. In addition 382 families of sponsored children were provided with supplementary nutritious grain from Yusuf Meherally Centre.

Apart from these children CASP Mumbai also supports 41 children who are undergoing higher education with support from AC International Child Support Denmark (Meritorious Students Project). These students are provided with support for tuition fees, coaching class fees etc.

CASP Mumbai Unit organized an ANNUAL GET-TOGETHER FOR SPONSORED CHILDREN AND THEIR FAMILIES on 7th February 2014 at Nutan Kharude Municipal Corporation Mandai Hall, Century Bazar, Worli, Mumbai to felicitate the children, who scored 75% and above marks in their Annual examination. 318 children were felicitated by Ms. Alka Desai, Hon.MLC, Maharashtra Vidhan Parishad. Prof. Asha Rane, Vice Chairperson, CASP Mumbai Unit, Dr. Pushpa Ahirwar - Ex. Corporator, Ms. Jadhav were also present on the occasion. Mrs. Sudha Joshi, Vice President, CASP & Chairperson of CASP Mumbai & Raigad Unit presided over the function.

CASP Nagpur Unit also organized an Annual felicitation function for sponsored children on 1st September 2013, at CASP office, Shivaji Nagar, Nagpur to felicitate the children who scored 60 % and above marks in their Annual Examination. 52 children were felicitated by Dr. Satish Sule , Eye Specialist and Ms. Manjusha Joshi, Maharashtra Times.



CASP RAJAGIRI outREACH

RAJAGIRI outREACH conducted 4 residential Career Guidance Camps for SSLC students from all the centres at the Rajagiri campus from 21st-29th December 2013. 400 students including CASP sponsored students, participated. Sessions on Motivation, Adolescent



Education, Career Guidance, Effective Study Tips, and Time Management etc. were delivered.

Souhrudam 2013

“Souhrudam” (Friendship) camp is conducted every year to improve the social and personal development of the students. The theme for the year was “Life Skills”. Songs which was conducted from April 6th to 8th ., Action songs, skits, mimes, project works, and effective



classes on Life skills etc were the major tools used to inculcate the theme to the children. At Arattupuzha the camp was held

The child sponsorship programme at Arattupuzha and Edavanakkad supported by Terre Des Homes, Denmark completed the project period of 8 years. Mrs.Dorthe Kristensen, the Chairperson and Mr.Jorn Verner, the

Secretary of TDH visited both the places and Rajagiri from 14th to 16th October, 2013. They visited Edavanakkad on October 14th and the people of Edavanakkad welcomed them warmly. The sponsored students and their parents shared their experiences and achievements of the project. The students were performed cultural programmes during the function. On October 15th they visited Arattupuzha and they interacted with the LSG officials and Panchayath representatives in an official meeting conducted at Panchayath Office. After noon a meeting was conducted at Government Higher Secondary School, Valiyazheekkal, where the sponsored students belonging to Arattupuzha are studying. The sponsored students, parents and members of the Development Committee were present in the meeting. Innovative fund was distributed to 210 students during the function. The TDH officials announced their willingness to continue the project with sponsorship assistance to 200 children (100 each from Edavanakkad and Arattupuzha) and assistance for micro employment programme for women. They also visited the houses of few sponsored students at both the places.



CASP GUJARAT

The Kutch area of Gujarat where CASP operates is an underdeveloped area where education particularly that of girls is still not considered a high priority by the families. To ensure that all children receive a basic education the unit implements various special programmes. Further the unit has provided sponsored children with material like school bag, uniform, school books and stationary to encourage their attendance in schools. In addition some children are supported by payment of school fees too.

Praveshotshav (School Enrolment Programme)

CASP Gujarat with the Govt of Gujarat runs a campaign for the enrolment of children in school in standard 1st every year called the Praveshotshav. This year the event was held in Lakhamsari, Govindpar, Badargadh, Kathathaddhar and Vasatava villages. 50 children were enrolled. Mr Vaghajibhai Patel M.L.A of Rapar, Mr. Shah Chairman of Gandhidham Area Dev. Authority, were among the dignitaries who appreciated the support provided by CASP.



School Transport

Since most of the villages in the area only have primary schools children tend to drop out of education after they reach Class VIII. To ensure that transport is not an issue the unit organised a Chhakdo (motorcycle rickshaw) to transport ten girl children to school during the year, having facility of education till primary, then one has to go near bigger village or town for secondary and higher secondary or college education. During the year CASP has provided school transportation to 10 children for the education purpose. Support for bicycle also provided to the children for schooling. Two children were also provided with bicycles.

Remedial Education

CASP Gujarat is running 6 remedial education centres particularly for subjects like English and mathematics. These centres are also being used as sites for various other activities for the programmes that the unit is implementing. A total of 200 children attend these centres. The students also underwent a test to assess their Minimum Level of Learning and the teachers then worked on the areas that required additional intervention.

School Support Project (Supported By TIPSMIDLER Denmark)

Tipsmidler of Denmark, through TdH Denmark provided various items to the schools of project area. Under this project computers, sports material books and thick mats (for the children to sit on) were provided to the schools at Lakhamsari and Kathathd dhar. The items were handed over by Mr Ivan Dalsgaard of TdH Denmark during his visit. Mr Dalsgaard also interacted with the children and encouraged them to use these facilities to increase their skills and be able to participate in the development of the country.



CASP PUNE

The unit supports 613 children under the Sponsorship Programme who were provided various tangible benefits. In addition the unit also conducts various activities to enhance the development of the personality of the children.

Skill Lab

Sessions were organized for children to learn to make tissue flowers, eco friendly Ganesh idols, creative writing and improving handwriting. These sessions





boosted the creativity of the children and provided them with an opportunity to make new friends. The creative writing workshop helped to improve their vocabulary and their writing skills. Their presentation skills also improved and the children started writing short stories and poems which were compiled and published in the unit's first children's magazine – "Navi Bharari".

Theatre /Drama workshop

The unit organised a theatre workshop during the summer vacations and 40 children participated. They learnt about stage and back stage work, script writing and of course acting. Mr. Ravindra Satpute facilitated the process which culminated with the staging of three one act plays. In November – Kalarang - CASP Pune Units' Theatre Group, was formally launched by the Mr. D.S.Kulkarni a prominent business man of Pune.



Library

The unit now has a dedicated space for the library which is open in the evenings to enable the children to exchange the books after school. Group sessions on

storytelling and reading out a passage of the book and discussions with their Development Promoters help the children to enhance their knowledge.

Science Exploratory

25 children from 7th,8th and 9th classes participated in a 15 days science workshop organized by Mukangan Exploratory Centre. Children were introduced to basic concepts in Geography, Physics, Chemistry, Biology and Mathematics through various experiments. This workshop helped the children with practical experience which has been useful to them during their academic year to prepare and present science projects.

Science Exhibition

17 children displayed different science projects developed by them. They explained different scientific principles behind the projects that they had made related to mechanics, electric, environment and space.



Sports Day



Pune Unit celebrated their Annual Sports Day where children participated in individual and team games. Sports teachers from the Pune University gave the children tips on

better performance, strength training and nutrition.

Felicitation

Children who had excelled in academics were felicitated by Mr. Pramod Kale, President CASP. 95% of the children passed during the



last academic year of which more than 60% students passed with a distinction. 5 students have been suitably employed with corporate organizations like Harbinger.



SPECIAL PROJECTS

SPECIAL PROJECTS

CASP also implements projects which are meant for specific focus groups. These include child labourers, differently abled children, orphans and children whose parents are in prison. These are implemented with the view to bring them into the mainstream and provide them with various benefits.

CASP PLAN DELHI

Differently Abled Children

The unit identified 247 differently abled children (146 male and 101 female) in the project areas of Madanpur Khaddar, Badarpur and Sangamvihar. Among these 16 are Visually Impaired, 37 are Hearing impaired, 121 are Mentally challenged, 19 are Physically challenged 16 have Cerebral palsy while 38 have Multiple disabilities. To address the needs of these children the unit is running 6 special education centres in which these children are enrolled. An Individual Education Plan for each child is prepared by the special educator and services of speech therapist, physio therapist are being provided at the centres. Fortnightly meetings were also conducted with the parents of these children to address their issues and provide them support.



These children (and their caregivers) are entitled to various concessions and benefits. Due to ignorance or an inability to comprehend the process of applying for these, the children are not able to avail of the same. The unit therefore made attempts to ensure that all entitled children should receive these benefits. During the year 29 children were mainstreamed (11 girls and 18 Boys)

in the govt schools and all of them continue to attend school regularly. Aids and appliances as per their need like calipers, tricycles, wheel chairs were provided to 48 children (30 boys and 18girls). Further 55 children with disabilities (33 Male &22 Female) received disability certificates and IQ certificates and 41 children (23 Male and 18 Female) received Rail Concession Certificates from the Govt. Hospitals and institutes. Identity Card/Pass Book from Delhi Govt. Authority was received by 21 children (10 Male and 11 Female) while 6 children (3 Male & 3 Female) received Bus pass from the DTC with support of CASP Plan.

Child Labour Project

More than 600 children of rag pickers in the programme area who are working with their parents were identified. Since their right to education and recreation are violated the staff have been working with their parents and the community to ensure that their rights are respected. With our intervention 194 children are now out of this work and they have been enrolled in the govt. schools. The unit is also running 6 Knowledge Enhancement Centres for these children to support them in their education. In addition to education, sessions on health and hygiene, hand washing, low cost nutrition etc were conducted. Parents Advocacy Groups were formed to talk about the issues of their community support the project activities and motivate other parents to participate in the development activities. During the period sports, exposure visits, were organized and they also participated in the events of national day celebrations. These families were linked with GRCs and other NGOs for health related interventions. Since it was found that more than 70% children are anaemic, they were provided iron supplements. The unit has also initiated anaemia prevention program for these children.

CASP MUMBAI

Differently Abled Children

CASP Mumbai had organized a one day programme for physically & mentally challenged children on 16th March 2014 at Chhabildas High School hall, Dadar (West), Mumbai. This was supported by the Sumeet Foundation, Mumbai through their trustee Shri S.R.Mehta. More than 70 children participated in the event where they participated in various games and competitions. In addition 70 hearing impaired children received hearing aids from the Foundation.



Foster Care Scheme (Bal Sangopan Yojana)

The unit is implementing the Foster Care scheme of the Department of Women and Child Development, Government of Maharashtra through foster care scheme since 2007 for 500 children. The project is implemented for orphans, children with only a single parent, children under the shadow of leprosy/HIV and cancer, street children and children of prisoners undergoing life imprisonment. The children are provided cash support for their education, health, nutrition and other requisite support to achieve the overall development of children. In addition regular meetings with children and their parents were conducted by the staff of the unit who made home visits. The families of these children were also motivated to ensure proper utilization of funds, which they received for their children's education, health and nutrition from the Govt. of Maharashtra. During the year the unit was inspected by Shri S.E.Desai, Probation Officer from Pune and Ms. Kalpana Khambayat, Probation Officer, Mumbai Suburban on 30 April 2013

and by Mr. Abdul Choudhari, Probation Officer from Ichalkaranji and Mr. A.R. Joshi, Probation Officer from Mumbai City on 8 May 2013.

CASP PUNE

Foster Care Scheme (Bal Sangopan Yojana)

The unit is implementing the Foster Care Scheme supported by Govt. of Maharashtra similar to Mumbai in Pune district where 500 children are supported. During the year the unit was inspected by Mr. K. V. Tidke, Officer, District Women and Child Welfare, Parbhani; Mr. A.P Khanapurkar Probation Officer, Parbhani; Mr. A.K Kulkarni NGO representative, Parbhani and Mr. S. R. Kumbhar, Probation Officer, Pune on 3.5.2013.

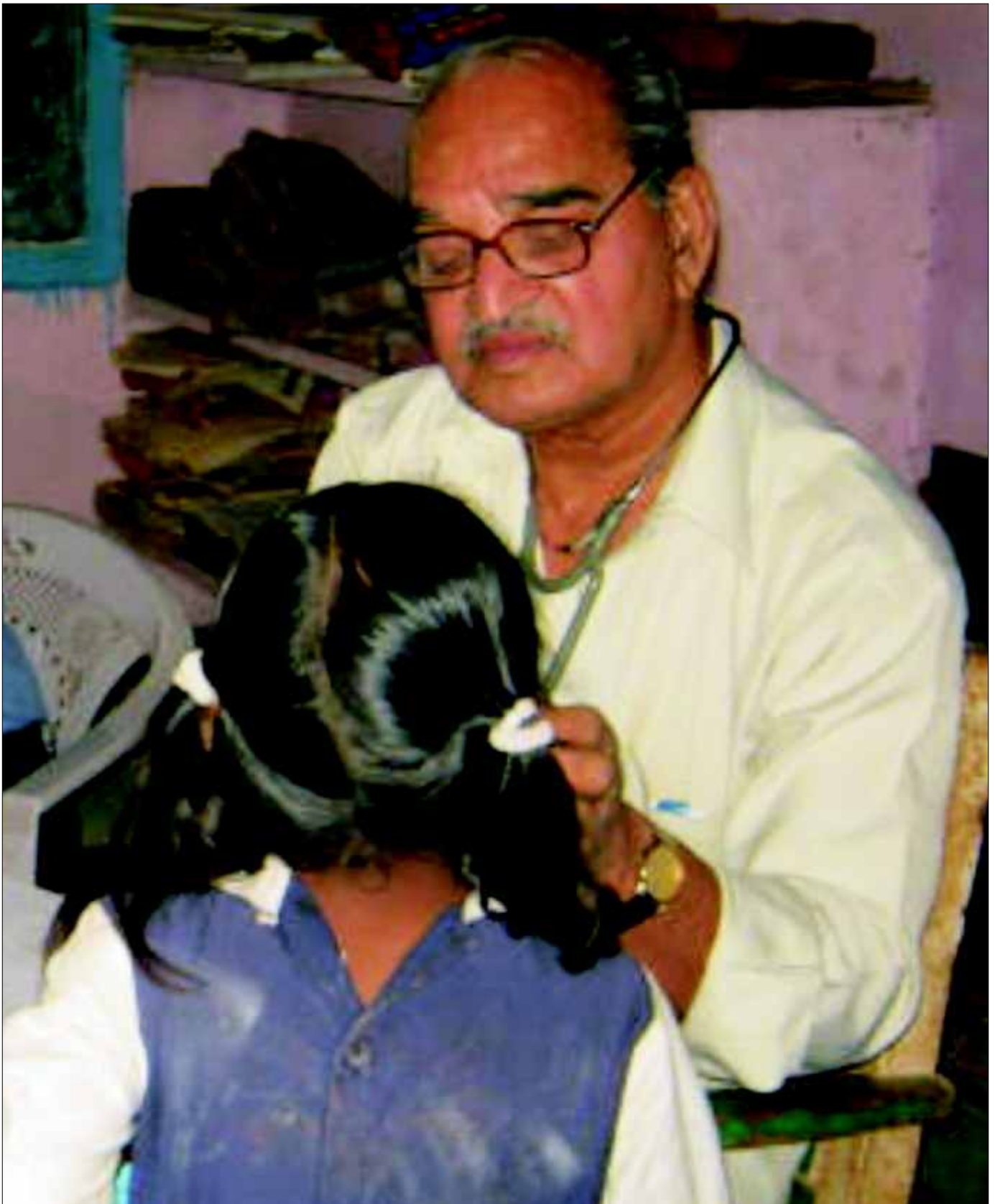
CASP DELHI

Tihar Jail Project

A special project is implemented by the Delhi unit to provide assistance to children with either one or both parents in prison. The objective of the project is to provide the children with their basic rights such as health, security and education. Currently 118 children of inmates scattered in different localities of Delhi are being supported through this initiative. They are provided tangible benefits such as uniforms stationery and books, health checkups, nutritional support. They are also provided counseling to deal with mental trauma and social stigmatization that they have to bear.

Every month on second Saturday; CASP Delhi organized a meeting with these inmates' children and their caretakers at Children's Park (India Gate) to understand the family related problem and current situation of families also during this meeting we provide educational support, nutrition support for the children CASP provide counseling for personal, legal and education related problems.

Innovative step taken by CASP where the inmate children meet with their prisoner parents without any obstruction to help in reducing misconceptions, misunderstanding and build connectivity between imprisoned parents and their children. 15 meeting in different jails were organized during the year.



HEALTH

HEALTH

Health is an important aspect in the development of any child, its family and its community. This is because health is a cross cutting issue in development with its impact on the ability to gain an education, participate in the work force and also in any activities in the community. To this end CASP has been conducting various programmes to improve the status of health of children and their communities across all units.

CASP PUNE

Health of the Urban Poor (HUP) is a demonstration programme being implemented in the slums of Tilak Road, Mundwa and Hadapsar wards of Pune with support from Plan India. A ward coordination



committees has been formed in the Tilak Road Ward where Link Workers(LWs) and Mahila Arogya Samiti's(MAS) engage with the ward officials responsible for health and sanitation services.



Representatives bring to the notice of the ward officials about uncollected waste, broken latches, unhygienic conditions in the unclean toilets and uncleaned areas. The Ward Officials are now regularly supervising the sanitation in the area. The MAS

members and LWs are monitoring the work of the cleaning personnel. Thus the committees have successfully demonstrated the possibility of coordination between the government and residents. The Mahila Arogya Samities are truly acting as community based monitoring agencies for appropriate utilization of government infrastructure pertaining to health and sanitation.

Give Us a Good Sight funded by AC International's Lions Mini Project is a programme focussed on reducing vision problems among children and women. This year the programme was implemented in our rural project area of Mulshi Taluka. Initially teachers were made



aware of the need for vision care and were trained in primary screening and detection of vision problems among children. With the assistance of the teachers, 500 children were screened for vision problems. 34 children found to have problems were referred to the ophthalmologist for treatment. Besides four under privileged senior citizens were provided cataract surgery under the programme. Chaitanya, a sixteen year old boy supported under the Foster Care Programme met with an accident and lost the vision in his right eye. He has been provided support for surgery for fitting in an artificial eye. The unit has also developed IEC material for early detection of vision problems and distributed the same to teachers and children.

CASP GUJARAT

Awareness on issues of health and hygiene: - CASP Gujarat unit organised regular programmes with the community to create awareness among people regarding health, hygiene, nutrition, personal hygiene and also regarding the issues related to child labour, child marriage etc. The unit has used plays and puppets as a means to create awareness in 9 schools of the project area and reached 2000 students regarding health and hygiene importance and gender issues. CASP has provided health and hygiene kit containing a towel, nail cutter, comb, hair oil, shampoo, soaps etc. This motivates the children to regularly bathe and keep their body clean. Since the Kutch region is now recording malaria CASP Gujarat has provided mosquito nets to all the 400 children with proper guidance on its use. Fifteen children from especially poor families were also provided with supplementary nutrition during the year.

Families who are below the poverty line are eligible for Rastriya Swasthya Bima Yojana – RSBY for treatment and for major illness. The Gujarat state government has also been providing Mukhya Mantri Amrutam (MAA) card which covers the family for treatment upto Rs. 2 lakh per annum. Due to lack of awareness and information, families have not been taking benefit of these schemes. CASP organised camps in Lakadiya and nearby villages and facilitated the applications for these cards by the residents. During the year more than 200 RSBY cards were issued.

During the year CASP social workers conducted one to one and one to group sessions with more than 200 individuals to create awareness about government health schemes. Since there are a number of quacks in the area they also created awareness about the need to take treatment from



properly trained doctors and facilitated treatment from registered and qualified doctors.

General Health Check Up was conducted to assess the health status of sponsored children, 250 sponsored children and their siblings were checked. Children were counselled to take care of teeth and hygiene. Medicines, vitamin and iron and de-worming tablets were provided to the children during the camp. Twenty children were also referred and supported for specialised treatment.

CASP TI Project CASP Gujarat with support from Gujarat State AIDS Control Society (GSACS) is implementing a Targeted Intervention (TI) project for prevention of HIV/AIDS in migrants in Anjar block of Kutch. This project initiated from November 2013 and the needs assessment and area mapping was completed by March 2014. A rally was organised on World AIDS Day with support from Rotary Club, Manavata Group and other organization working on this issue at Gandhidham to create awareness.



CASP Gujarat also acknowledges the assistance provided by various individual health care providers and facilities' like Dr. Naveen Thakkar, Sahyadri Hospital, Dip Hospitals, and Wagad Welfare Hospital for providing treatment in emergency or critical cases on the request of the unit.

CASP DELHI

CASP Delhi unit is providing health services to the residents of the Madanpur Khadar on a regular basis throughout the year. These services include regular awareness programmes on health and nutrition issues and health camps and clinics in different blocks of the locality. More than 2500 people availed of the health camps & clinics. The unit is also running a weekly eye clinic with the support of R.P. Centre (AIIMS) during the year 2013-14 and more than 1500 people availed of this service. A dental clinic has also been conducted regularly in collaboration with Jamia Dental College since September 2013. Every month more than a 100 people are availing of this facility.

Prevention of Quackery in the Community:- CASP Delhi Unit undertook a project for "Prevention of Quackery in community" in Madanpur Khadar, J.J colony, with support from Directorate of Health Services, Government of NCT of Delhi. The objectives of the project were to increase awareness among the residents regarding good health practices and to save them from quacks practicing in the community.



The project was initiated on 28th February 2014 with focus group discussions with peoples of the community to understand their knowledge, attitudes and health seeking behaviours. Students of Tata Institute of social sciences (TISS) Guwahati, conducted a survey to assess awareness and reasons for adopting wrong health practices by the residents of Madanpur Khaddar. Their principal findings were that lack of proper health care facilities and services, lack of time, poor transport linkages & shortage of funds, are the reasons people opt for treatment from quacks.

On the basis of this information ten community meetings were organized by CASP in different locations, to sensitize the people about various malpractices in the medical field. These meetings were addressed by CASP staff and a panel of doctors and Dr. Deepa Dua (Govt of Delhi). More than 250 people were directly sensitized through these meetings. CASP Delhi also prepared a list of resources, facilities and services and distributed this in the community.

Ten street plays were also written and enacted which reached out to more than a thousand people across the community. CASP BAL PANCHAYAT members also took the message to their radio programme on community radio FM 107.4 (Noida Radio). On 28th March 2014 a wrap up workshop was organized at Seth Vidhyalaya in Madanpur Khaddar, 80 participants from different groups of the community like teachers, NGO workers, CBO leaders, representative of women and children groups participated. Dr. A.K Jamrani (CDMO South East), Dr. Ayaz and Dr. Farida (Rural Health Centre, Madanpur Khaddar) addressed the workshop.

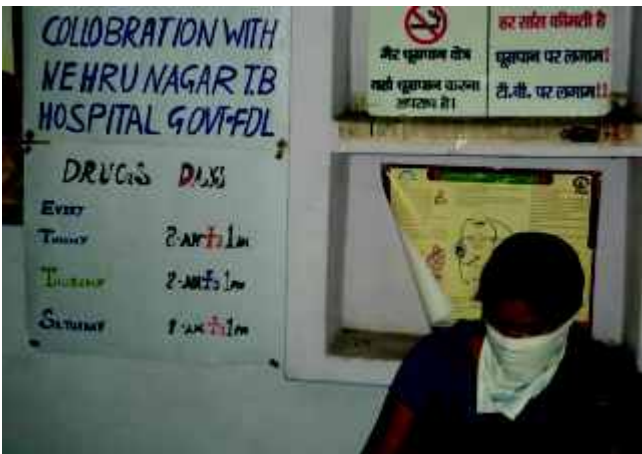
CASP PLAN DELHI

The unit primarily focuses on maternal and child health. Twenty Five Community Health Workers working in designated geographical areas have been trained and identified a total of 468 pregnant women. The workers conducted sessions on immunization, supplementary nutrition and registration for ANC checkups and institutional delivery. They identified 28 high risk pregnancies and motivated these women for institutional deliveries. A total of 191 deliveries took place in the hospital and 53 deliveries were conducted at home by trained birth attendants. Three groups were also formed with the purpose of developing linkages with anganwadies and creating awareness in the

community about ICDS services so that community is benefitted. Refresher training was organized for all the community health workers information about govt schemes was given to them. " Saas Bahu Jalsa" which was sessions organized with 75 pregnant mothers and their mothers-in-law to provide correct knowledge on birth preparedness, breast feeding, supplementary nutrition etc.



World AIDS day and World TB day were celebrated in the community to generate awareness on prevention of the diseases. The Unit is running a DOTS centre in collaboration with the govt where 45 patients are under treatment and 34 patients completed their TB treatment in the year.



CASP MUMBAI

The unit conducted a number of health related activities during the year. These ranged from creating awareness and providing information to conducting health diagnostic checkups and providing treatment services.

Awareness – was generated by organizing various events. From 17/6/2013 to 21/6/2013 a life skills education programme was organized by the unit for 60 Adolescent girls at Sarvodaya project centre. The issues discussed during this event included physical and psychological changes during adolescence, menstrual hygiene,, pregnancy and childbirth, contraception and HIV. The girls were also provided with special sessions on abuse, shame and honour issues, and the skills required to deal with stalking, abuse etc.



The follow up of this awareness programme for adolescent girls is organized regularly by community health workers. The objective of this is to ensure that the girls have an opportunity to develop the life skills that will equip them for safe responsible sexual lives and parenthood.

A session for pregnant mothers was organized on 27th September , 2013 where Dr. Subhada Joshi conducted an interactive session on ante-natal, intrapartum & post -natal and care. She also emphasized on immunization, breast feeding and appropriate supplementary feeding practices. 32 pregnant mothers participated in the programme and follow up sessions were conducted by the community health workers . The women were encouraged to avail of the various health services which are being providing through monthly health check up camp, community health clinic and referral services to the L&T Health Centre at Andheri.

An awareness programmes on HIV/AIDS awareness was conducted on 12/12/2013 at Filter Pada, and 125 women participated in the programme. Mrs Vijaya Kanase from MDACS and Mr. Ramchandra Salunke were the resource persons.

Diagnostic camps – A general medical check-up and a

haemoglobin estimation camp were conducted on 14th and 28th June 2013 respectively. It was noted that 18 girls were anaemic and were then provided with iron tablets. A second health check-up camp was organized on 26/11/2013 for 100 marginalized girls between the age group of 13 to 18 years at Navneet Seva Mandal at Worli. A team of three Doctors examined 95 girl children and also provided. Medicines to the girls who needed treatment.

CASP Nagpur Sub unit organized a dental check-up camp for sponsored children and their parents on 1st December 2013 with the collaboration of Dr. Harish Rathi, Dr. Vinay Vaidya, Dr. Satyavardhan Pande, Dr. Tushar Mohata, and Dr. Payal Gandhi. 150 children and parents participated of which 65 sponsored children and parents were diagnosed with dental conditions. Dr. Harish Rathi then provided treatment at a very low cost.

A Healthy Baby Competition was organized on 25th Jan. 2014 in Filterpada as part of the Sarvodaya project



where 577 children of the age group of 6 months to 5 years old participated. A team of four doctors from the Larsen & Toubro Health Centre examined the children as per the healthy baby indicators and among them three children in each group were selected as winner.



In addition fifteen consolation prizes were also given. Celebration of Nutrition Week - Nutrition week was celebrated on 4th September, 2013 by organizing a session on nutrition for the tribal community at Maroshi pada. Ms. Atmaja Raje, Nutritionist conducted an interactive session and also demonstrated the use of available vegetables, pulses etc. The demonstration focussed on maintaining the nutritional value of foods.

World breastfeeding week was observed from 1 to 7 August 2013 at Filterpada with the objective of protecting, promoting, and supporting breastfeeding. The community health workers provided information to women where 60 mothers participated. The community health workers also conducted awareness programme on Safe drinking water and water borne disease and Personal and community hygiene.

65 awareness programmes were conducted and 1600 beneficiaries were covered during the period under report.

Each community health worker carries first aid box during their visit or programme in the community and provide medicines to minor illness patients. This activity enables to reduce the water borne disease and also to maintain the normal health.

A first Aid Box has been provided to each health workers which they use to provide the health services on minor illness.

The General health check-up camp in the communities was organized during the year.

During the health check –up at Maroshipada it was found that majority of mothers and children were anaemic Accordingly HB testing was organized on 22nd May, 2013 . Out of 87 beneficiaries, 21 patients were , (women -3 and 18 children) found anaemic. 21 patients were also provided medicines as per the doctor's advice. The cases are being followed up by community health workers.

Community Health Clinic The community health clinic at Filterpada, is an ongoing activity to provide health services to mothers and adolescent girls. Since April 2013 to 31st March 2014 Dr (Mrs) Sita Guraraja visited the clinic once in a week. During her 38 visits, she has checked 403 patients. The following services have also been provided with support from L&T Health Centre Andheri :-

We are also monitoring the data base of patients to assess the present status of the community.

A Special health check-up was organized for elderly people at Filterpada on 20th November 2013 and necessary medicines were provided to all elderly people. 33 elderly people availed of these services.

CASP RAIGAD

CASP Raigad unit arranged medical checkups of 320 sponsored children at Vavoshi, Gorthan, Narangi, Shirki, Nizampur and Pen. The check up was done by Dr. Pallavi Manohar, Dr. Pradeep Patil and Dr. Abhijit Bhosale. All the children were given Deworming tablets.



CASP RAJAGIRI outREACH Kerala

A medical camp was held at Edavanakkad on September 29th , 2013 to detect cataract with the support of Chaithanya Eye Hospital, Ernakulam. 210 patients utilized the camp facility and those who were detected cataract had undergone surgery at the hospital free of cost.



CASP PUNE RURAL UNIT

CASP-PLAN PPTCT PROJECT

This project is being implemented by the CASP Pune Rural Unit with a special focus on Prevention of Parent To Child Transmission of HIV (PPTCT) since May 2010. The goal of the project is to reduce HIV infection among women, adolescent girls and children in the twelve blocks of Pune district in Maharashtra state through awareness, increased community involvement and increasing the uptake of services on PPTCT, care, support and treatment. This is done by integrating PPTCT into maternity, post-natal, and child welfare services to capture every opportunity to reach all women. This is facilitated by the provision of ongoing care and support to People living with HIV/AIDS (PLHIV). The project has also facilitated the formation of PLHIVs' support groups in all working areas. In the meetings of these groups the PLHIV are able to share their feelings, seek social support, and access income generating activities.

In addition CASP linked 130 PLHIV with Government under Sanjay Gandhi Niradhar Yojana vide which a PLHIV individual gets Rs 900 per month as pension from the Government. Also 10 CLHIV linked up with FPA-Family Planning Association, Pune to receive monthly nutrition from FPA.

Link worker Scheme

CASP Pune Rural Unit is implementing this scheme for National AIDS Control Organisation (NACO) since March 2010 in 100 villages in ten blocks of Pune District. The area is vast and the villages are scattered which is a challenge for the staff of the project.

Objectives

There has been a realisation in recent years that HIV is not just an urban issue and rural areas are equally affected. Thus this project reaches out to rural populations to create awareness and implement interventions regarding HIV in rural areas too. The specific objectives are to: -

- 1) Reach out to HRG's and vulnerable men and women in rural areas with information, knowledge, skills on STI/HIV prevention and risk reduction.
- 2) Increasing the availability and use of condoms among HRG's and other vulnerable men and women.
- 3) Establishing referral and follow-up linkages for various services including treatment for STI's testing and treatment for TB, ICTC/PPTCT services, HIV care and support services including ART.
- 4) Creating an enabling environment for PLHA and their families, reducing stigma and discrimination against them through interactions with existing community structures/groups, e.g. Village Health Committees (VHC), Self Help Groups (SHG) and Panchayati Raj Institutes (PRI).



SAIYUKTA:- A major innovation of this scheme is the establishment of SAIYUKTA centres which have been established in 18 villages. The centres are used for activities of the project and also provide information about HIV/AIDS through IEC materials, posters,

banners, pamphlets etc.. Information about social schemes is also made available at these centres which promote folk media and cultural events

WAD Activity: World AIDS Day was organised in first week of December 2013. Rallies were organised in 5 schools in different clusters where 4800 students from 10th standard to college level and nursing students participated. Awareness sessions were also organised in two schools in Indapur cluster and IEC materials were distributed.

Mid-Media:- Total 60 flock troupe organized. The unit organised street plays in 60 villages with the support of DAPCU. The supervisor and concerned link workers supported and organised the street play in their respective villages. The main purpose was to create more awareness among the village people.

Awareness program: were organised for the Red Cross Society where 30 volunteers participated and another for the nursing students of Anand Medical Foundation.

In order to take this process forward linkages have been created with government officials and non-government parties. Advocacy meetings were conducted with Medical Officers and elected members of Panchayat Samitis and the Zilla Parishad. A series of meetings were also conducted with various institutions at the block level.





ADOLESCENTS

ADOLESCENTS

Adolescents are an important focus group for CASP as these are the future citizens of the world. The interventions are implemented with a view to provide them with the correct skill set to face the world. Among these interventions health, education and livelihoods for adolescents remain the primary areas of focus.

CASP PLAN DELHI

Young Health Program The focus of the project is on adolescent's health and this project is being implemented in Madan Pur Khaddar and Badarpur area. The unit has established 6 Health Information Centres (HIC) in these locations. Here sessions on different issues like reproductive health, T.B, malaria, malnutrition, health and hygiene were conducted with adolescents using audio visual aids. Street plays and magic shows were organized in the community to spread the message on adolescent's health. The unit has also trained 240 peer educators (120 boys and 120 girls) from among the community. A refresher training was organized for them and they have subsequently conducted awareness sessions in the community.

Training was also organized for teachers on adolescent health issues. 14 teachers from govt schools participated in the training.

A stake holders meeting was also organized in which 26 persons from other NGOs and govt departments like MCD, Jal (water supply) Board, malaria, govt teachers, and ICDS authorities participated.

Two anaemia prevention camps were organized in the community for girls in which 171 girls participated and their haemoglobin was checked. It was found that 60% are anaemic. They have been provided necessary advice and treatment.



CASP DELHI

Sport's Club activities are important for proper physical and mental growth. CASP Delhi therefore runs a sports club for the sponsored children and their siblings. 240 children and youth are member of this club where every Sunday they gather at park to play and practice their favorite sport. Cricket, Football, Badminton, Kho-Kho, Chess and Carom are very popular games. About 100 members regularly play here and some of our members have even participated in various state level competitions.



Under the youth club CASP Delhi is also providing them with a platform for holistic development of these 240 children through various activities like debate, quiz, painting, theater and yoga classes.

With the help of HCLT volunteers the unit also organized various sessions to upgrade the knowledge of the students like; career counseling and guidance and life skill training.



CASP MUMBAI

Health Awareness Programme to Adolescent Girls The unit organized health education programme for Adolescent girls from 17/6/2013 to 21/6/2013 at the Sarvodaya project centre. 60 adolescent girls attended the programme and a detailed report in the chapter on health.



CASP GUJARAT

Youth Group CASP Gujarat has supported the formation of three youth groups which are working to support our activities in their areas. Over a period of time we expect them to develop into a pressure group which can advocate for the development of the area.



Career Guidance Programme was conducted to provide direction and information regarding various courses and guidance about entrance exams, fees and scholarships for higher education. This was organized by Kutchmitra –Janmabhoomi newspaper group and experts from Kutch University.



SENIOR CITIZENS PROJECTS

SENIOR CITIZENS

CASP works primarily for the development of children but it also works towards the development of their families and the community at large. With the increase in life expectancy in India senior citizens are an increasing proportion of the population and with the social changes that are rapidly occurring seniors are more and more marginalised. They are no longer viewed with respect and their knowledge and experience is no longer considered an asset to the family. They thus tend to be neglected and are not given their due in society. To remedy this situation CASP implements programmes for seniors to keep them engaged, provide them with a peer group for interaction and to monitor their health.

CASP MUMBAI

CASP Mumbai Unit runs four Day Care Centres for seniors. The details of these are as follows: -

Through the year, the seniors attend the centre every day in the afternoon where they participate in various activities. These include Yoga, prayers, indoor games, music, bhajans etc. The resource persons at these centres also discuss news paper articles and issues like safe drinking water, nutrition, etc. The members are also provided some nutritious snacks every day to supplement their diet. Occasional games and competitions also provide the seniors with a change in their schedule.

A health check-up was organized for elderly people at Filterpada on 20th November 2013 where 33 seniors underwent the check-up.



Excursions for the seniors were also organised to Keshav Shrushti, the Global Vipassana Pagoda Gorai, Ganeshpuri & Vajreshwari on 28th January 2014,

CASP RAIGAD

For the last four years the unit has implemented a seniors centre at Nandimal Naka, Pen. 31 senior citizens regularly attend and participate in activities like yoga exercises, newspaper reading etc and also receive a supplementary nutritious snack.

Excursions for the seniors were conducted on 18th January 2014 to the Titwala Ganpati Temple.



The Senior Citizens thoroughly enjoy the activities at the centre every day, as they usually feel alone and left out. Attending the centre gives them a regular routine, enables them to make friends, makes their leisure time enjoyable and gives a positive outlook to their life which in turn keeps other family members relieved and happy.



CASP PUNE

CASP Pune Unit implemented a day care centre for senior citizens in Parvati Area slum cluster with support from Henry Lamotte Oil Mills. Various weekly and monthly activities were implemented for the senior citizens with the objective of bringing them together and giving them a space in the community. The women participated in yoga classes, recreational activities, Bhajani Mandals, health checkups and celebration of festivals. Information on different government schemes beneficial to the elderly was shared with them. Individual psycho-social and legal counselling was also provided.



A group of senior women now get together regularly to sing bhajans in the temple in the community once a week. The unit was also successful in initiating yoga classes which are now conducted by the Urban Community Development department of the Pune Municipal Corporation. Similarly we have liaised with HelpAge India which now sends a mobile clinic to the community every fortnight to cater to the health of the elderly. We have facilitated the applications of ten elderly women with no family support who are now receiving a monthly allowance under the Sanjay Gandhi Niradhar scheme.



COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

CASP is committed to the concept of child-centred community development. This entails the development of communities which are committed to the development of their children by ensuring that the rights of children are respected and they are provided every opportunity to develop to their fullest potential. This is made possible when communities come together to identify and address issues that affect them as a whole. This approach is implemented by means of organising communities to this end and also to ensure that children are given their rightful position in participating in decisions that affect them and their development.

The various units of CASP have been engaging with the communities where they work to this end and have initiated a series of programmes in Water and Environmental Sanitation (WES), engaging with the government to ensure that they receive their entitlements and to solve community issues by their own initiatives. Formation of groups particularly those of women and children are an important initiative to this end.

CASP PLAN DELHI

Women's Groups

The unit has helped establish 18 Self Help Groups of women in the program area which have a total of 216 women members. During the year they saved Rs. 3,08,245/ and distributed loans amounting to a total of Rs. 2,54,265 among the members. There were no defaulters on the repayment of loans among any of the groups. During the year they have also been provided training on financial literacy and the food security act.



Water and Environmental Sanitation:-

The unit implemented a programme to ensure that safe drinking water was available and waste disposal management was done through community participation. To this end the unit undertook advocacy at the family, community and school level. During the year two toilet monitoring committees were formed to supervise and ensure proper maintenance of the

community toilet complexes (one committee per toilet) in Madan Pur Khaddar (MPK). These community toilet complexes are being run by the women's group, "Nari Nirmal Awas Samiti" which charges Rs. 2/ per use. The money is used for cleaning and maintenance of the complexes.



A children's group named "Green Force" was formed in the community with about 80 children members to advocate against open defecation. They were provided training and then went on to conduct awareness sessions in the community and in the schools of the area. The children spoke about the need to either construct individual toilets in homes or use the community toilet complexes. As a result now 590 families have constructed toilets in their houses. The group also met with the school principals to review the water and sanitation facilities and suggest improvements. A meeting was organized to bring the

concerns of the community before government officials on 28th March 2014 at ICC, Mohan Estate New Delhi where officials from various departments including water supply, urban development, Department of Family and Child Welfare etc participated.

Global Hand Washing Day was celebrated in three government primary schools of Madanpur Khaddar in which more than 550 boys and girls participated. Children were told of the importance of proper hand washing. On the occasion proper steps of hand washing were exhibited soaps were distributed. The children were then exhorted to disseminate these messages to their families, siblings and in the community. Hand washing Day was also celebrated in the Knowledge Enhancement Centre of the Child Labourer Project.

CASP RAIGAD

CASP Raigad unit continued with the village development project at Gaicharanwadi, Taluka Panvel, which was initiated in 2012, supported by Terre des Hommes (TdH). The primary objective of this project is to bring the residents of this tribal hamlet into the mainstream by providing them with the necessary skills to realise their rights and entitlements. During the current year the Village Development Committee which was comprised exclusively of men was expanded to include an equal number of women. Registration of the residents with the Unique Identification Authority programme and provision of AADHAAR cards was taken up as an urgent measure. As a result 150 residents were registered and all have received their AADHAAR cards. Further in order to ensure that the residents are able to receive their entitlement of low cost food grain and fuel



20 residents were assisted to apply for ration cards from the Public Distribution System. Till the end of the year all 20 residents had received their ration cards. Further 50 residents obtained certificates of caste authenticating their status as tribals.

During the year the Village Development Committee also undertook various meetings with the contractor to pursue the completion of public works in the village. When there was no action from the contractor the Village Development Committee met with Mr Vivek Patil, the Member of the legislative Assembly of their area to petition him. This took a lot of persuasion on the part of the unit staff as the residents did not believe that it was possible to meet with such an important person. The success of this meeting has been a huge boost to their confidence.

In December 2013, the ration shop which was located at a distance of 2 kms from the village was shifted to another location which is 10 kms away. This caused the residents a lot of inconvenience and access was thus limited. Mr. Kiran Kadam Development Promoter, discussed the issue with the residents of Gaicharanwadi and also the neighbouring hamlets and encouraged them to visit the Panvel Tehsil Office and meet the Supply Officer and Tehsildar in this regard. A delegation consisting of Mr. Bhagwan Deshmukh (a local political worker) and 50 villagers (mostly ladies) then visited the Panvel Tehsil Office on 7 February 14. They met Mr. Shashikant Waghmare (supply officer) and Mr. Adhik Patil (Residential Nayab Tehsildar) to whom they presented their request for the shop to be shifted back. We are glad to share that the ration shop has now been shifted back to Chawane and this has not only facilitated access to the facility but also boosted the confidence of the residents of these villages.

CASP Raigad unit has provided the following leveraging support at Gaicharanwadi

- Solar lamps provided to eight families
- Eight Street lights provided to the village
- School supplies provided
- Construction of house facilitated
- Completion of internal road facilitated

In addition the unit also received the support from the State bank of India, Pen Branch for the ICDS Centre (Aanganwadi) at Gaicharanwadi in the form of cupboard. Further slates, slate pencil box, notebooks

and sacks for school children from 5th to 7th std and junior college students were also provided.



The need for supportive training of tribal youth to apply for jobs in the police force was identified and the same is also being supported by TdH. Accordingly, 3 youth namely Mr. Raju Wagh, Mr. Naresh Wagh and Mr. Ramesh Wagh have undergone training at 'Shree Career Academy', Nerul from 25th November 2013 for four months for the police training course. They have passed the physical tests and are due to appear for the written exams soon.



Mrs. Dorthe Christensen, Chairperson Terre des Hommes, Denmark, Mr. Joern Verner Stendorf, Webmaster and Editor, TdH News, Mr. Jan Schou, Brand Ambassador for TdH in Denmark, and Mr. Mogens Pedersen, along with HO officials visited Gaicharanwadi on 11th October 2013. During the visit the residents expressed their gratitude to the visitors for the support that they are being provided. Mr.

Zodape, the school head master, also thanked TDH Denmark for providing school support. The visitors were overwhelmed by the warm welcome given by the villagers and expressed their satisfaction with the work done by CASP at Gaicharanwadi.



The tribal residents of Gaicharanwadi are entirely illiterate in that most cannot even sign their names. The need for providing them with skills of functional literacy to enable them to read sign boards on buses and in shops was strongly perceived. It was also necessary to provide them with basic mathematical skills to be able to calculate costs of items and wages that are due to them. To facilitate this process, Adult Functional Literacy classes for 2 groups of 20 men and 20 women were commenced at Gaicharanwadi on 20th January 2014. This is supported by the Rotary club of Orion, Pen. Mr. Hari Kondilkar, teacher of the local government school is conducting these classes which run from Monday to Wednesday for women from 8.00 to 9.00 pm. Similarly classes are conducted for the male students from Thursday to Saturday from 8.00 to 9.00 pm.

Bal Panchayat

CASP Raigad unit supports 4 balpanchayat groups in the villages of Kandale, Kandalepada, Gorthan and Vavoshi.

Formation Of New Balpanchayat Group At Village Irwadi:

A new balpanchayat group was formed at village Irwadi in the month of February 2014. Initially Mr. Kiran Kadam- Development Promoter Raigad unit, met with children in the age group of 10-18 years and initiated the idea. Then the children were briefed by Mrs. Nivedita Thakor Co-ordinator CASP Raigad unit and Ms.

Bhagyashree Patil member of Balpanchayat group Kandale. The Head mistress of Raigad Zilla Parishad school and other teachers were also present during these meetings. 30 children from Irwadi then formed the 'Shree Hanuman Balpanchayat Gat'



CASP DELHI

A prominent feature of the community development programme in Delhi is the Clean Khadar project. This was initiated in 2011 with support from HCLT and is being implemented in one block of this resettlement colony. The project continues to provide a garbage removal facility to 600 houses and employment to three "Safai Mitra". The residents pay Rs 20 per household per month for the garbage removal and the safai mitras are paid Rs 1200 pm for the service. This is a sustainable process where recyclable items (paper, plastic, iron and glass) are sold by the workers who also get an additional income from this sale. Apart from improving the standards of environmental sanitation the project has also created sustainable livelihoods for three families. We have been receiving requests from other blocks to initiate similar programmes in their areas too and we are actively exploring possibilities of increasing our reach with this project.



On the occasion of World Environment Day 5th July, 2013 CASP Delhi Unit staff and volunteers from the HCLT Foundation jointly conducted tree plantation. In this process they were ably supported by the members of the CASP-HCLT Youth Club Centres. Mrs. Simi Suri, Ms. Arunima and Mr. Kinshuk from HCLT motivated the volunteers and staff to do their utmost in this activity. The members of the Youth Clubs presented the visitors with handmade flowers, which were made by them during creativity workshop; every volunteer planted a plant along with group of 4-5 children. Around 100 plants were planted in the community most of which have survived till now. This is due to the active attempts of the area who have been watering them through the dry season and protecting them from damage.



CASP Delhi has formed a "BAL PANCHAYAT" in 2005 in Madanpur Khadar to increase the understanding of the children with regard to the democratic process and to enhance their participation in decision making at the community level. Presently 250 children are general members and an executive committee of eight members. The Executive Committee is elected by the

child members and the elections to the bal Panchayat were held in the month of October 2013 to elect representatives for one year. CASP Delhi Bal Panchayat is implementing various awareness programmes and community welfare projects like Clean Khadar, Sports Club and Community Library & E-Learning Centre etc. The executive committee is actively monitoring community development activities and spreading awareness on social issues through street plays, community radio FM 107.4 (Noida Radio) and community meetings. CASP Delhi BAL PANCHAYAT is also a member of Delhi Child Rights Club which provides support for advocacy of child rights at the state level.



The unit has also formed and supported thirty self help groups through the GRC initiative and self defence classes were also conducted for girls in the community. More details about these are in the chapters on the GRC and adolescents.

The sports club and the community library and e-learning centre are described in detail elsewhere. However these projects are greatly appreciated by the community who consider these the assets of the community and are now being trained to manage these on their own.



CASP MUMBAI

CASP Mumbai Unit manages two Bal Panchayats, comprising of 15 to 20 children each. One Bal Panchayat at Pandurang Vidyalaya, Mulund is supported by the Linda Morse Bal Panchayat Trust and the other at Chunabhathi is supported from the CCCD Funds of the unit. During the period under report regular Meetings were conducted and they conducted awareness programmes on health issues and environmental sanitation. They have also undertaken tree plantation at the school and in their community.

Two Self Help Groups of women are active in the project area. The groups have a total of 32 members. The women run a small business of food items and participate in the exhibition cum sale organized by Government and NGO and earn through this activity.

CASP Mumbai Unit implements the Sarvodaya Project in Filterpada area of Mumbai with support from the L&T Public Charitable Trust. The objective of the project is to ensure a healthy, happy and harmonious community. To this end CASP implements various programmes in the field of health and livelihoods which are detailed in the respective chapters.

In the months of April 2013 and January 2014 the unit implemented a Clean Community Competition. Community based organisations (CBOs) were motivated to clean their vicinity by organising the competition. The community health workers



conducted meetings with the CBOs and explained the objective of this activity and accordingly they were motivated to participate. Six main indicators and 38 sub indicators were identified to assess the status of cleanliness and CBO's were given two weeks time to

prepare. In the competition held from 15th April 2013 to 30th April 2013, 21 CBO's participated and 5 received prizes. In the competition held from 1st January 2014 to 15th January 2014, 20 CBO's participated and again 5 were given prizes. The team of judges included representatives from CASP and L&T PCT.

The prize distribution function of Clean Community Competition and Healthy Baby Competition was held on 26th January 2014 at Filterpada, Powai. Shri Pramod Kale, President, CASP, Smt. Sudha Joshi, Vice President of CASP, and Ms. Harshada Kulkarni Dy.Executive Director (Programmes) participated on behalf of CASP. , Dr (Mrs) Usha Krishna, Trustee, Larsen & Toubro Public Charitable Trust, with other officials from L&T including Shri R.N. Mukhiya, Adviser to Chairman, Shri G.Ramkrishna, Shri Malik, Shri R.P. Deshpande, were present for the programme,.



Mr. T.G. Pawar,. Project Manager, CASP Mumbai Unit welcomed all and then prizes were distributed. The Chief Guest and Guest of Honour congratulated and appreciated the work of CBOs and the parents for their efforts and commitment. The programme ended with a vote of thanks.

CASP PUNE

A pilot project to develop a vegetable farm was initiated in coordination with Sahyadri Shikshan Mandal on 1000 sq ft of land near the boys hostel in Vinzai Devi High School, Tamhini. The land was levelled and fenced by the students of the boy's hostel and their teachers. Seeds of vegetables like brinjal, chilli, pumpkin and tomato were sowed and the plants nurtured. Waste water from the hostel was utilized to water the plants. A

fair amount of vegetables were grown and used by the hostel mess. In the process the children also got an experience of using waste water for farming and the importance of optimal utilisation of land.

CASP Pune Unit participated in the Joy of Giving Week (JOGW), to raise funds, through various events from 2nd Oct'2013 to 8th Oct'2013. The unit put up Wish Trees as part of this process. The wishes of the children were put up on the "Wish Tree" and donors were given an opportunity to contribute and fulfil the wishes of the children. Wish Trees were put up in Amanora School, VMware Technologies, J W Marriott and the Poona Club. We were able to reach out to a receptive audience in at all the venues. The unit raised more than Rs. 75,000 in the process.



CASP GUJARAT

CASP Gujarat organised a demonstration Kitchen Garden through Posters and pamphlets in 4 primary schools and a High school in Lakadiya village with help from Green Dream group from Rapar. Mr. Yogesh Joshi gave information regarding importance of kitchen garden for maintenance of health, and the environment. CASP distributed 500 packets of seeds of various vegetables like tomato, cucumber, brinjal, lady finger, lauki etc to the families of sponsored children and also to the community. This initiative proved successful families who have space around and their house for kitchen garden enthusiastically developed them.

CASP social workers regularly inform beneficiaries of the various like Manav Garima, Vadil Vandal, widow



pension etc that can be availed by people. They provide assistance to complete the forms and submit them. More than 250 families received the benefits of Government schemes during the year.

Emergency assistance - During the year there was a flood in Govindpar and Kathathdhdar area of Rapar. Heavy rain (more than 13 inches) and strong winds on 26th and 27th September 2013 caused severe damage in some areas of Rapar and Bhachau block of Kutch. Govindpar which is a remote village situated on the state highway from Rapar to Chitrod was cut off as a bridge on the road to the village was washed away. As a result the village was totally cut off and emergency assistance could not reach the village.

CASP Gujarat approached to the Government officials to request for assistance and was in touch with the public works dept. Our efforts along with the assistance of the local community and Gram Panchayat resulted in two JCB heavy loader and three tractors being deployed to construct a temporary road to the village. We appreciate the assistance provided by Mr. Ramjibhai, Mr. Ramesh, and Mr. Karshanbhai. Mr. Masharubhai, Mr. Pethabhai, Mr. Gelabhai and the sarpanch of the gram panchayat.

Fifty houses in Kathathddhar area of Rapar sustained severe damage due to the heavy rain. The residents are very poor and a large number of children supported by the unit live there. Emergency assistance was provided from the government and repairs were conducted from funds provided by TdH Denmark through Mr Ivan Dalsgaard who raised funds specifically for this project from the sponsors of the children and other benefactors.

Bal Panchayat Activities - CASP supports five active BAL Panchayats which are comprised of children who are socially aware and work for the benefit of the community. The Balpanchayat of Lakadiya village visited the Village Gram Panchayat (Local Self Government body) and sought information about the Gram Panchayat, funds and their utilization. They also shared their concerns regarding the status of sanitation in the village and petitioned the panchayat to take action. The children also organised a Rakhi making completion on the occasion of Rakshabandhan. The senior members of the BAL Panchayat of Lakadiya, Govindpar and Rapar villages also held meetings with the younger members of the panchayat to mentor them to work for the community. This was done by sharing information on activities conducted in the past and their experiences. The children were also able to motivate parents to send enrol their children in school.

Beti Bachavo Andolan Members collaborated with ten other NGOs, CBOs and groups and participated in the various programmes for the 'SAVE GIRL CHILD' initiative. In Suvai village these children arranged rally on the issue of and also organised a poster making and essay competition.



Day Against Child Labour 12th June 2013 was celebrated by the BAL Panchayats by organising rallies, poster making and essay competitions. Children also visited the families of children who are involved in labour to motivate their parents and make them aware of the rights of the child.

World Environment Day 5th June 2013 was observed by children by preparing small pots for the water for birds and making small wooden houses for them. They also discussed the importance of nature and the environment.

Bal Sena of "Shaishav" an organisation based in Bhavnagar visited CASP BAL Panchayat: to interact with the children and share experiences. The meeting gave children an opportunity to share their activities and knowledge and also learn about other initiatives being undertaken.



GRC ACTIVITIES

GENDER RESOURCE CENTRE (GRC) ACTIVITIES

Delhi Government implements Gender Resource Centers since 2007 with the objective of Social, Economical and Legal Empowerment of women, particularly those belonging to the underprivileged sections of the society. During the year 2013 – 14 CASP ran two GRCs at Madanpur Khadar, and Sangamvihar. The total population covered by these GRCs is more (MPK 1,40,000; and Sangamvihar).

The GRC worked for the empowerment of women and to facilitate access to government schemes. This was done by awareness generation regarding health, nutrition, women rights and safety. The GRCs also provided skill trainings.

LIVELIHOODS

LIVELIHOODS

CASP focuses on livelihoods from the perspective of providing young people with the opportunity to participate in the economic development of the country. This is not always facilitated by the Indian education system and therefore CASP organises programmes to provide young people with the necessary assistance. Similar programmes are also conducted for women to ensure their economic productivity as this leads to increase in expenditure for the development of the family.

CASP MUMBAI

CASP Mumbai has for the past many years been successfully conducting numerous training programmes to prepare young women (and also men) to be economically productive. The training programmes were primarily planned to provide women with the skills to establish small businesses within their households and thus generate additional incomes for the family. The training programmes provide women with skills required to establish beauty parlours, provide dress-making services and advanced dress making. In addition due to numerous requests from our beneficiaries we have also commenced courses in computer usage. The training is being conducted at three locations in Mumbai with support from L&T Public Charitable Trust. During the last year we trained: -

At the end of the last year we had trained a total of 1050 individuals and 577 of them are gainfully employed or manage a business of their own.

A soft skills training was also conducted for these trainees on 28th September, 2013. 90 trainees were given inputs on establishing businesses, maintaining the quality of the product, marketing, etc.

CASP Nagpur Sub Unit took 15 sponsored children for a



visit to a denture manufacturing facility to familiarise them with this option. Children were introduced to the skills that are required to produce good quality dentures and other artificial teeth and also provided with advice regarding the scope of a career in denture making.

CASP DELHI

A workshop on Entrepreneurship Oriented Program (EOP) was organized in January 2014 in collaboration with National Small Industry Corporation (NSIC) in NSIC auditorium near Okhla. 52 women from existing CASP SHGs were provided with information about small scale businesses including Biscuit making, Soap Making, Tailoring machines to Knitting machines, Bakery etc. the unit is now exploring the possibility of assisting these groups in obtaining loans from banks to establish their businesses.



CASP Delhi unit has been operating a Computer Learning Centre in Madanpur Khadar since 2007. Currently the centre is supported by AC International Child Support through their Development Fund. During the year 100 students were enrolled in the Basic Computer Training course of which 81 students appeared for the exam and received certificates from Jan Shikshan Sansthan (JSS). 09 school students did not appear for the exam as they were enhancing their knowledge for the school curriculum. They have performed well. Of these 12 ex-students are now successfully working in private companies.

CASP Delhi Unit and HCLT Foundation organized a Job Mela on 19th July, 2013. Jobs were on offer in the Security, House Keeping and Technical departments of various companies. 157 people from Madanpur Khadar and nearby communities participated in this Mela. 30 people were shortlisted and finally ten person got jobs in the security and technical Departments.



CASP PUNE RURAL UNIT

CASP-PLAN-ABF Saksham Project:

SAKSHAM is an initiative, which aims to redefine and enhance livelihood opportunities for victims of commercial sexual exploitation and trafficking (VOCSET) and women affected by AIDS (WAA). This project is funded by Axis Bank Foundation through Plan India. The project aims at reaching out up to 5000 beneficiaries from Pune District of Maharashtra State and contributes towards sustainable livelihood



opportunities. This will be achieved by ensuring their household economic security, accelerating their rehabilitation and mainstreaming them into formal economic activities and consequently prevent second generation trafficking and HIV.

The project will achieve this by Forming livelihoods groups of VOCSETs and WAAs living in the same area who will be organized into joint liability groups (JLGs) of 5-8 members. They will then be assisted in identifying opportunities for livelihood promotion provided group counselling and aptitude building support and monitoring and follow up support

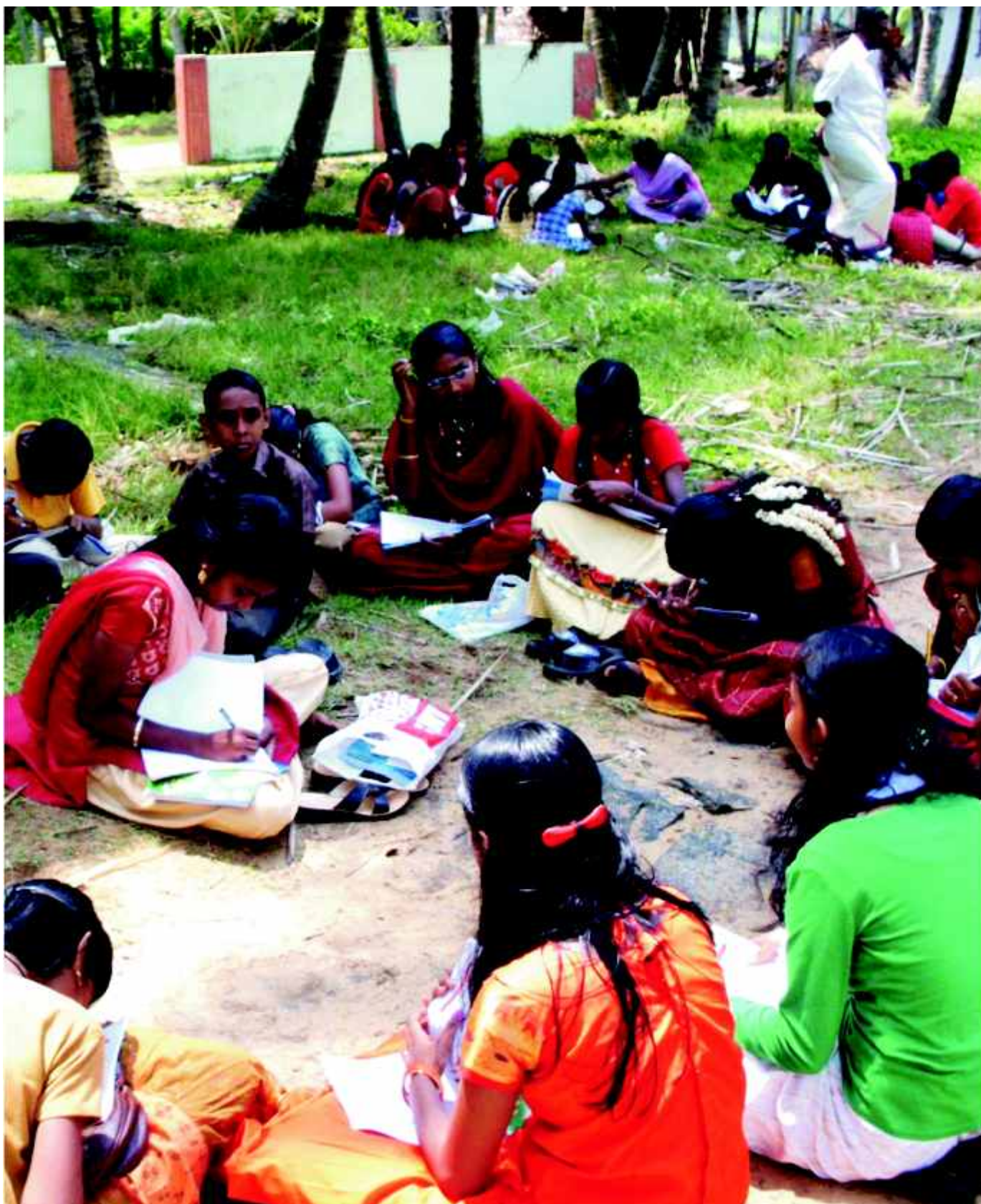
It is expected that VOCSETs and WAAs in Pune district would be able to rebuild livelihoods by engaging in mainstream income generation and job employment. Since women are prevented from the burden of seasonal migration (which increases their vulnerability) their children will have access to adequate nutrition and school education. This in turn will result in prevention of second generation trafficking and HIV among the women and their children.

The work of this project is ongoing since May 2012 in 10 blocks of Pune District. In due course we plan to cover the entire Pune district under this project in both rural & urban area. Linkages have been built with government officials and non- government organisations and advocacy meetings conducted with Medical officers, elected members of local self government bodies and various formal and non formal institutions working at the block & district level. Training programmes on book keeping, life skill education, business planning, market feasibility, liaison with Banks and other financial institutions have been conducted. 438 members of 208 JLG groups

participated in these events.

In the year under review 1152 prospective beneficiaries were identified, 137 groups formed and assistance has been given to 726 beneficiaries in the form of Revolving Loan Fund. The groups in turn have passed on assistance @ Rs.3000/- per member to 297 beneficiaries & @ Rs.4000/- per member to 429 beneficiaries.





TRAININGS

TRAININGS

We at CASP emphasise training as a means to enhance the capacity of our staff to implement programmes that fulfil the needs of our beneficiaries. To this end we conduct training programmes for our staff. Apart from this we share our experience and knowledge with other organisations and individuals too by conducting training programmes for them. During the year numerous training programmes were conducted.

CASP DELHI

HCLT Workshop and Survey

A workshop was conducted for the volunteer staff of HCLT on 16 June 2013 in which 30 staff of HCLT participated. The staff were trained on conducting social surveys by Ms Upadhyay and staff of Delhi Unit and subsequently actually conducted a door to door survey of families in Madanpur Khaddar Resettlement Colony of Delhi.

Training on fund raising

CASP Delhi staffs Mr. Arun Shah (Account officer) and Mr. Abu Talib Khan (Programme Officer) attended three days training programme on fund raising organized by Vishwa Yuva Kendra (Delhi) from 22 to 24 August 2013. The objective of the training was to enhance the skills of the young NGO's workers for fund raising. During the training programme participant had learned techniques, skills and formalities of fund raising and information about newly passed CSR bill, various schemes and programmes of Government of India.

Staff Training

CASP Delhi unit organised a training program for project staff, community volunteers and unit staff; it was a four month programme started in the month of September 2013. It was an on job training, total 26 staff including GRC and HCLT Project staff and field staff participating in two hour training on every Friday.

This training was facilitated by Ms. Shilpa Singh, it was a well designed programme; focused on following topics; written and verbal communication, documentation, time management, conflict management, team work, office management & etiquette.

This was a good opportunity for the staff to upgrade their skills also during the training they share their field experiences, which were very useful learning for others.

CASP PLAN DELHI

Child Protection and Care

A consultation on Child protection and Care was conducted in Delhi on 10 December 2013 by CASP Plan Delhi and the Delhi Commission for Protection of Child Rights (DCPCR). Representatives from Delhi Police, the Child Welfare Committee and fifty NGOs working with children participated. The consultation focussed on the existing mechanisms to address child protection and care, identify challenges and ways to ensure that children grow safely in an environment where people are sensitive to their rights. The role of different agencies, the need for co-ordination in their functioning and creating awareness among stakeholders was discussed.



CASP HEAD OFFICE

A one day workshop on “Imparting Life Skills Education to Adolescents” was conducted in Panvel on 28 October 2013. Staff from Mumbai Unit and from Raigad Unit participated. Various issues such as body mapping, physical and psychological changes during adolescence, pregnancy and childbirth, and also contraceptive use. The initiative was supported by Soonabai Pirojsha Godrej Foundation, Mumbai.

Today, Jayshree works with a beauty parlour at Tunga Village Resort, is independent and also contributing to her family.

Sonali has made her parents who are bamboo craftsmen and CASP very proud. She is a good Kabaddi player. She is playing Kabaddi since she was 12 years old. Kabaddi has given Sonali confidence. She has travelled to different districts. Being a state Level player. She is working hard to get recognition at the National Level. May her Dreams come true.



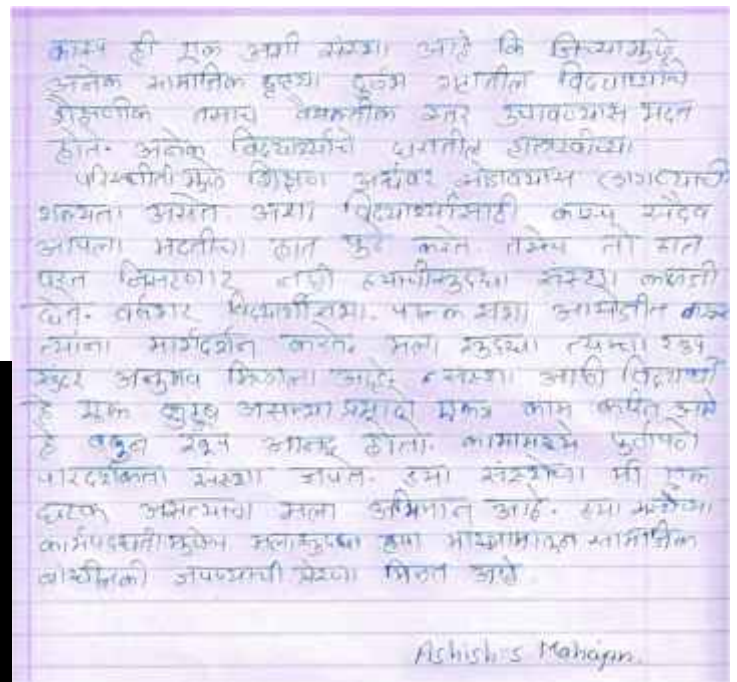
8. Sakshi Shinde

CASP-PLAN-ABF Saksham Beneficiary - Smt. Mina Talekar

Smt. Mina Talekar is a 35 year old woman at Manchar, Tal. Ghodegaon whose husband is ill and does not have a regular job. She has a 18 yhear old mentally challenged daughter and a school going son. She (and her daughter) were identified as vulnerable women who may be trafficked and therefore included in the CASP Pune Rural units Saksham Project.

Mina is a member of a JLG (Joint Liability Group) with five other women like her and received a revolving loan of Rs. 3000. With this she started a backyard poultry business with a few hens. Today after

International Leprosy Union (Health Alliance)

This year i.e. in the year 2013-2014 ILU organized a programme of Felicitation of Women Leprosy worker from 8 states of India. On 10th of April women workers from 8 states across the country were felicitated by the highest dignitary Vice President Of India Hon Mohammad Hamid Ansari at Yashada Sampada Auditorium. Governor of Maharashtra Hon K Shankar Narayanan was the chief guest. Our patron Justice Chandrashekhar Dharmadhikari was the guest of honour. On Minister for Social Welfare Government of Maharashtra was also present.

In the year 2013-2014 ILU organised various training programmes for the Persons affected by Leprosy. The basic reason to organize these programmes is to create awareness about the disease and to reduce stigma and discrimination. Leprosy does not just affect people's health. Apart from medical issues people with leprosy face stigma and discrimination which can result in exclusion from their family and community and loss of access to their means of employment and government facilities including education and healthcare. Relatives of people affected by leprosy also face stigma and exclusion due to their association with a person with leprosy. Awareness and understanding are the first steps toward taking action to tackle leprosy. ILU organized sensitization workshops, awareness events, press conferences and campaigns to sensitize local health workers. This year ILU organized four workshops on Human Rights violation in four endemic states of the country such as Chhattisgarh, Bihar, Jharkhand and Odisha.

This year ILU has started Two CDC Child Development centres in Maharashtra. One is in Anandvan Leprosy colony Dapodi And the second one is in Meghajibhaiwadi Leprosy colony Miraj. India is home to around 60% of the world's leprosy-affected. Despite the fact that most of them are cured, they and their children are forced to settle in one of 800 leprosy colonies in India. Due to stigma of being Leprosy affected person, they are neglected and separated from the main stream of society. Most of them are refused to be a part of social, culture activities with other members of the society.

The children who are living under shadow of leprosy are deprived of all basic needs, which are adversely affecting their Educational as well as Socio-economic Development.

ILU initiated this development programme for children under shadow of leprosy. The fact is that their parents are affected by leprosy but now fully cured & isolated from the society. Where education facilities are available, secondly there education institutions do not admit these children even if they admit: they are not treated well, due to stigma of their parents. Therefore, ILU is taking interest in developing Child development Centers for these children of affected people. ILU is making efforts to bring up their educational level; In addition, due to Poor economic conditions they cannot afford quality education to their children, Childhood of these children is not properly nurtured.

ILU-HA gives top priority to the development of children under Shadow of Leprosy. The project in reality is an investment in future and way to assure the affected persons that the future of their children will be bright. Because of the circumstances, children under shadow of leprosy are being deprived of educational opportunities and therefore it is proposed to start a Child development Center in this colony.

I am very happy to mention here that our both CDCs are running very well. And children are very happy. With proud I would like to mention here that ILU has participated in Best India NGO award competition organized by Rockefeller Foundation. We have been selected in top ten best India's NGOs of the country.

International Longevity Centre - India

The International Longevity Centre-India (ILC-I) is a not-for-profit company working for senior citizens in the fields of Research, Training, Policy, Advocacy, Documentation and Field Projects since 2003. ILC-I is one of the fourteen members of the Global Alliance of the International Longevity Centres and was founded by the eminent social scientist and gerontologist, the late Dr. S. D. Gokhale.

The present President of ILC-I is Padma Vibhushan Award winner and the renowned scientist of international repute, Dr. R. A. Mashelkar. The Vice President of ILC-I is the former Chairperson of the University Grants Commission, Dr. Arun Nigavekar. The Chairman of ILC-I is Mr. Jayant Umranikar, the former Director General of Police.

- The field project of ILC-I is "Aajibaisathi Batwa" – a project to provide partial medical sustenance to needy and elderly grandmothers above the age of 60 years, run through sponsorships. Many of these elderly women are abandoned by their families, live alone, are widowed or divorce and are in need of medical support.
- ILC-I, with the support of PNB Metlife organized two training programmes on "Planning for Retirement" for NCL on the 8th of May 2013 and for PRAJ on the 7th of June 2013.
- ILC-I, in collaboration with CASP organized the Dr. S. D.  - One days sensitization programme for senior citizens/RWAs on the 24th of March 2014.
 - Two days' Consultative Meet on 'Human Rights and Gender Dimensions' on the 25th and 26th of March 2014.
 - One day Sensitisation programme on 'Maintenance and Welfare of Parents and Senior Citizens Act, 2007' on the 27th of March 2014.
 - One month certificate course on "Basic Issues in Geriatric Caregiving."

D. Gokhale award for "Promoting Qualitative Journalism in Ageing".

5. Objectives of the organization and main activities of the year.

Community Aid & Sponsorship Programme (CASP) is an Indian, non profit, nongovernmental organization that was established in 1975. The organization seeks to impart development opportunities to underprivileged children across India to enable them to take their rightful place in the world.

CASP is committed to the comprehensive development of children and has adopted a holistic, participatory approach towards children's well-being. Through sponsorship it helps and guides children, their families and communities towards development, empowerment and self reliance.

CASP empowers women and communities to take informed decision and enabling them to access their basic rights. Its programs for children and their communities include, Early Childhood Care and Development, Reproductive and Child Health, Income Generation Programmes, Child Rights, Advocacy, Community Development Programmes, focusing on Habitat and Sanitation, Creative Skills and Vocational Programs for children especially girls, HIV/AIDS awareness program etc. CASP also works for the ageing population and strives to ensure for them healthy, productive and participatory ageing.

All CASP programs are built around the principle of participation and sustainability. Participation is encouraged and accepted at all stages of program planning, development, implementation and evaluation, thereby, paving the way for community ownership of the programs.

Using a cross sectoral approach targeted at multi level stakeholders, communities build networks within and outside, and form linkages with other organizations and government bodies to successfully sustain development. As an example, CASP's Child Rights and Advocacy Program has its own Bal Panchayat and Bal Sabha where children elect their own members, and undertake efforts to generate funds, organize Child Rights Convention by involving other organizations etc.

Similarly, adolescents are trained as peer educators to impart important health information to other youth. The Reproductive and Child Health programmes incorporates training of local community women as Community Health Workers while formation of self help groups and community based organizations enables communities to choose their own development agenda and take action to realize it.

CASP's activities for children and their communities include,

- Ensuring the health and well being of children, their families and their communities and the ageing population
- Ensuring the health and well being of the ageing population and providing them opportunities of recreation.
- Empowering women financially and socially and enhancing their decision making capabilities.
- Providing equal educational and vocational opportunities to children; especially to girls; and to adults to enable them to lead secure lives resulting from decisions based on informed choices.
- Improving the living conditions in communities by helping communities access governmental and nongovernmental resources and empowering them to develop internal resources.
- Helping children and communities to spread awareness about their activities within and outside communities and garner support for further development.
- Guiding children in expressing their empathy with the outside world and taking concrete steps towards contributing to the society.
- Undertaking special programs that help the most marginalized children of the communities and enabling them to find their place in the society.
- Networking with governmental and nongovernmental, national and international organizations to bring about an increased pace of development and a better understanding of the development processes.
- CASP currently works through its eight offices across India. Its Head office is based at CASP Bhavan in Pune. The staff consists of over 200 people from diversified fields and varying competency levels. A key part of CASP's work force is its non staff members – the community workers and volunteers who belong to CASP communities and carry CASP's message from house to house.
- The total number of sponsored children as on 31st March 2014 are 9267
- CASP is governed by a Governing Council of eminent personalities from various fields including social development health, administration and education.
- CASP funds are generated through sponsorship programmes, governmental agencies, foundations and other non-governmental organisations, corporate houses, individuals and internal sources.

6. A review of progress & results achieved in the year 2013-2014

In 2013 – 14 the focus areas for the work of CASP continued to be education, health, and livelihoods for underprivileged children. The creation and support of strong communities also remains one of our key result areas, communities that are engaged and committed to providing a better tomorrow for their children while they also strive to become more self-reliant.

During the year CASP implemented a revision of pay scales for our employees after a gap of more than a decade. We are now totally compliant with the Minimum Wages Act. Further we also conducted in-house training programmes and deputed employees to attend training programmes conducted by other organizations, in order to enhance the skills of our employees.

In Mumbai CASP continued with its vocational training programmes at four locations in Mumbai and also enhanced its community interventions by commencing work in four communities along the Jogeshwari Vikhroli Link Road. In Pune continued implementing the urban health program where communities are now engaging with the Pune Municipal Corporation. The CASP Kalarang Group was also established in Pune this year to encourage children to explore their talents in the performing arts. CASP also continued with its focus on prevention of transmission of HIV and also increasing income for marginalised women across Pune District. In Raigad, CASP continued its work with tribal community in Raigad District of Maharashtra and assisted the residents to engage with elected representatives and government officials to ensure that their basic documentation was received and access to the public distribution system was facilitated. In Delhi we continued to work in some resettlement colonies of South Delhi with numerous programmes for protection of the rights of children. The efforts towards disposal of garbage provide a model for environmental sanitation that also provides employment. In Gujarat the geographical reach of CASP increased with a HIV awareness being launched in Anjar area.


